New York, Dec. 28.—A cable to the Herald from London this morning says: "The British raid on Cuxhaven on Christmas Eve, when a squadron of seven light cruisers, destroyers and submarines slipped past the German mine fields and attacked the big naval base, has given rise to further demands on the fleet. Writers in the newspapers were asking why, if Cuxhaven can be successfully attacked, cannot a similar raid be made on Heligoland itself, on Wilhelmshaven, or even on the Kiel Canal."

BRILLIANT AND DARING.
