LAUD KENNEDY'S RAILWAY PLAN

Statement Made To Commons by Minister Is Considered "Explicit."

Brief Session Held Tuesday Preceding Easter Recess.

OTTAWA, April 11.—Considerable surprise was expressed tonight because of the 6 o'clock adjournment of the house by many of the members. It is understood that the short sitting today, however, was by arrangement, so that the members could complete their preparations for returning home and make train connections tonight without waiting until tomorrow. The last day of the Commons recess provided ample food for thought for the members, and in the railway statement many of them will find great scope for their powers of concentration to tackle, and for their brains to toil over.

The most repeated phrase heard tonight concerning the statement of Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, made in the house today, is "Clear, very clear and explicit!" There were no wasted words in the statement, nor attempts at oratorical flights, but only a straightforward statement of the government's attitude toward the monumental problem of Canada's nationally-owned railways.

Though the opposition inferred in the speeches of its members that the statement of the minister would be the subject of considerable criticism when the main railway estimates were taken up, it is thought that this is merely a subterfuge to escape the onus of finding fault with a statement that does not easily lend itself to unfavorable criticisms or onslaughts.

One month has passed practically since the house opened, and tonight a summing up of progress has been going on. That the fourteenth parliament has so far made great strides, in view of the peculiar political situation it had to face with the new parties in the house, is the consensus of opinion.

GOOD PROGRAM ARRANGED FOR RALLY OF BAPTISTS

Discussions of Current Issues, Exercises, Prominent Speakers Included.
Baptist Young People Unions will hold their annual rally in Talbot Street Baptist Church Good Friday, April 14, during afternoon and evening sessions, and a program has been arranged which includes prominent speakers and discussion of current issues among churchgoers of today.

The afternoon session opens with a debate, "Resolved, that the home is a more potent factor in Christianity than the church," and it is expected that interesting opinions will be expressed on this subject, which is considered one of the most important questions concerning young people with which the church has to deal.

Following the debate will be an exercise, "The Challenge of the Cross," in which all delegates are asked to participate.

During the supper hour the young people will be given the opportunity of improving acquaintance with each other and also of practicing yells and songs for the convention of Baptists in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec which are to be held shortly.

At the evening session Rev. J. L. Stot of Niagara Falls will deliver an address dealing with many of the problems which face the young people of the present generation.

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Day's Legislative Doings at Ottawa

TODAY IN PARLIAMENT.
House of Commons.
House stands adjourned until Wednesday, April 19.

The Senate will not sit until Tuesday, April 25.

YESTERDAY IN PARLIAMENT.
In the Commons.

Hon. W. C. Kennedy, minister of railways, presented his first railway budget to the house at the opening of the afternoon sitting. He announced that the total deficit on the Canadian National Railways last year was \$56,573,334, as compared with \$67,505,059 the year previous. The net loss on the Grand Trunk for the year, including fixed charges, was \$15,672,239, as against a loss for 1920 of \$6,627,243. The total loss on the Canadian National and Grand Trunk systems stands at \$72,346,234.

Discussing the statement, R. Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the opposition, said that it was gratifying and a tribute to the management instituted by the late government. He charged that the present administration had delayed the work of unifying the system.

The House of Commons adjourned at 6 o'clock for Easter, to meet again on Wednesday, April 19.

SPANISH FORCES CAPTURE CITY

Government forces have occupied Tamaisi, capturing thirteen cannon and much artillery ammunition. The statement says the government "is highly pleased with the results of the brilliant operations."

WANT INSTITUTIONS FOR ERRING YOUTHS PROVIDED

Social Service Workers Will Seek Legislation To Improve Conditions.

Final details are to be arranged at a meeting of the executive of the Ontario Social Service Council in Toronto, Tuesday, April 18, for the general assembly of social service workers, which is to be held in Brantford, April 8-11. The conference is to be chiefly taken up with the consideration of child welfare work and further legislation in the interests of dependent and neglected children. The social service council has already accomplished much in the matter of legislation for children and is concentrating now on obtaining laws which will further improve conditions.

One important law which the council will attempt to have passed is to raise the age of juveniles from 16 to 18 years and to provide institutions where wayward juveniles may be properly cared for instead of being confined in the common jail.

Further activities of the Social Service Council were announced on Wednesday by Rev. T. D. McCullough who stated that a field day was planned for Stratford Sunday, April 30, when representatives of the Social Service Council of Ontario would address meetings. On the Monday following, Mr. McCullough stated, he expects a meeting will be held for the reorganization of the Stratford Social Service Council, which has hitherto been almost dormant.

DISMISS ACTION AGAINST FARMER

The action of Mrs. Gertrude Brown of Melbourne against Donald Campbell, of Ekfrid township to recover \$2,434.12, alleged to be due her by Campbell, was dismissed with costs to the plaintiff, according to a judgment handed down by Judge Talbot Macbeth Wednesday.

The case was heard before Judge Macbeth at the non-jury sittings of the county court at the court house last week, the proceedings lasting over two days. The defence alleged that Mr. Campbell had paid over all money due the plaintiff, and that nothing was owing her.

J. M. McEvoy, K.C., appeared for Mrs. Brown, and J. C. Elliott, K.C., for Campbell.

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CLAIM DYE PACT WAS FORMED

Leeds, England, April 12.—The Yorkshire Evening News yesterday published particulars of a commercial alliance which, it says, has been concluded between Germany and France. The newspaper says it is understood a leading French dyestuffs company has come to an agreement with the German dye trust under which the Germans agree to give France all the technical assistance in their power, to disclose the secrets of their laboratories, tell how they are designed and send trained German chemists to French factories to superintend the secret processes in actual manufacturing operations. The French have undertaken, says the News, that their output of dyestuffs shall be confined to the demands of France and her colonies, and they consent to hand over to the Germans 50 per cent of their profits.

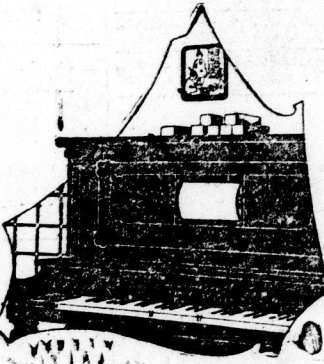
