





### Drug Trafficker to Serve 20 Years In Penitentiary For Manslaughter

MONTREAL, Sept. 22.—"This illicit traffic in cocaine, morphine and other drug poisons, this scourge which is flaying our province must stop. I am going to render a terrible sentence. In future I think I may give life sentences to those found guilty of a similar kind of offence."

With these words, thundered in a voice which resounded in every corner of the court of king's bench, Mr. Justice Monet this morning condemned Willie Fournier, 41-year-old drug trafficker, to twenty years in the penitentiary for manslaughter through having caused the death of Albert Laporte on June 28 in a local dive, where he sold the fatal dose of morphine to the lad, who was from L'Assomption.

Five minutes later the same judge condemned Yvonne Desbiens alias Proulx, 20 years old, to five years in the penitentiary also for manslaughter, through having caused the death of 19-year-old Alfred Fontaine on June 28 last by injecting heroin into his arm at a St. Denis street drug party. She, it is alleged, was a drug addict and the victim of men of the type of Fournier.
