VOTE ON HYDROLobo Councillors Decide To
Refer Long-Disputed Issue
To Ratepayers.Authorize Reeve To Prepare
Bylaw For Taking of
Plebiscite.Lobo Township will have the op-
portunity of deciding by vote whether
hydro-electric power will be brought
into the township or not.The hydro feud in the township
has existed for some time; meetings
have been held both by taxpayers
and council of the township with no
result, so the council has decided to
let the voters give their decision.The following resolution was passed
at the last meeting of the council:
"Moved by Donald Gray, seconded
by William Chapman:"That whereas application has been
made to the municipal council of the
corporation of the township of Lobo
to sign a contract with the hydro
commission to guarantee the collec-
tion of certain sums of money an-
nually for the term of 30 years to
meet the expenditure of delivering
electric power to certain ratepayers
of the township, and whereas the
contract covers only a portion of said
municipality:"We, the members of this council,
are unanimous in our opinion that
the matter be referred to the rate-
payers of the said township:"And that the reeve be authorized
to secure a bylaw granting the tak-

1920.MANY ISSUES
AWAIT LEAGUEAdmission of Russian Refu-
gees To Canada Will Be
Discussed.Dominion Delegates Also In-
terested in Allocation of
Geneva Expenses.OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—(By Canadian
Press).—Big issues will come before
the assembly of the League of Na-
tions at Geneva in September, when
Canada will be represented by Hon.
W. S. Fielding and Hon. Ernest La-
pointe. Among them is expected to
be a proposal for the admission of
Germany to the league, while an ap-
plication for admission has already
been filed on behalf of Hungary.The agenda of the sessions, which
has been received here, consists of
a score of items of varying im-
portance. Canada is especially inter-
ested in the proposal made by the Cana-
dian delegates at the last meeting
for the excision of article 10 from
the treaty. This is the article which
binds the signatories to the peace
treaty, to respect and to defend each
other's boundaries. It is likely that
the attitude of the Canadian delegates
this year will differ slightly from that
assumed by Hon. C. J. Doherty and
Sir George Perley at the last meet-
ing. Instead of asking for the
deletion of this section of the covenant,
it is probable that the Canadian dele-
gates will suggest that instead of an
agreement to take military action,
there should be, as in the case of the
four-power treaty at Washington,
merely an agreement to seek a remedy
by consultation.Another subject of special con-
cern to the Dominion is a responsi-
bility the high commissioner appoint-
ed by the league in regard to Rus-
sian refugees. There is a strong
desire in some quarters that Cana-
da should open her doors to these
refugees, but as many of them are
not regarded as suited for agricul-
tural pursuits, there is a good deal
of doubt in government circles here
of the wisdom of admitting them.Other matters on the agenda are:
An amendment to article 18 of the
Covenant, which requires that all
treaties between members of the
league should be registered with the
secretariat before they become bind-
ing.Esperanto as an international
language.Report of the temporary commis-
sion of the league on the reduction
of armaments.Proposals for the constitution of
three standing committees on econ-
omics and finance, communications
and transit, and health, including the
epidemic commission.

Will Discuss Expenses.

The question of the allocation of the
expenses of the league will again
come before the assembly. Canada
at present pays as large a share as
the United Kingdom or France, but
an effort is being made to secure an
allotment more in proportion to the
part played by the Dominion in the
affairs of the league.Mr. Fielding and Mr. Lapointe will
sail from Quebec for England on
Tuesday next, Aug. 22, by the Cana-
dian Pacific Railway steamship "Em-
press of Scotland." The assembly
opens at Geneva on September 4.
After the assembly closes, Mr. La-
pointe will visit France and will re-
main in Europe for the International
Labor conference, which meets in
Geneva on Oct. 18. At that confer-
ence, Hon. James M. Macdonald, minister
of labor, will be co-delegate with the
minister of marine.FAIL TO AWARD TENDER FOR

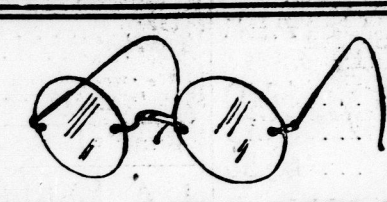
