TEMPERANCE MEETING
FOR FIVE COUNTIES

O. T. A. Is Indorsed—Government Control Pictured As a Failure.

Palmerton, June 26.—The temperance meetings held here yesterday afternoon and evening were very largely attended, with representatives in attendance from Bruce, Huron, Grey, Perth and Wellington counties. Enthusiasm was evident in all meetings.

At the afternoon session resolutions were adopted to be forwarded to the provincial government, setting forth opinions of the gathering on present temperance legislation. Reports were presented on law enforcement in different localities, and results of enforcement of the Ontario temperance act were discussed at length.

The mass meeting was held in the evening in the Library Hall, with an overflow meeting which comfortably filled the Methodist Church. Wm. H. Kerr, editor of the Brussels Post, was chairman of the main meeting. Mr. Albert Hassard, Toronto, spoke convincingly of the benefit derived from present temperance legislation, and contrasted conditions in Ontario prior to enactment of the O. T. A. with the present.

Dr. Henry took for his discourse conditions existing in British Columbia, and claimed that government control was merely government sale, and did not control, but only legalized sale and consumption of liquor in that province. He alleged that the bootlegger had not been driven out of business; that more dives existed now than ever before; that the use of narcotic drugs had increased in that province more than in any other in the Dominion.

Hon. E. C. Drury pictured conditions existing in Ontario 30 years ago, and contrasted present conditions. He warned his audience against the possibility of losing the benefits already attained.

Dr. Oaten, field secretary of the Prohibition Union of Canada, presented a resolution, drafted at the afternoon session, which called for more rigid enforcement of O. T. A. and expressed approval of the principle of the act.

A. E. Greenlaw, Detroit, possessor of a wonderful voice, sang several selections.

MOVE TO HAVE SMALL
ESTATE PAID OPPOSED

Capital Trust Company Suggests Widow Be Paid Whole Amount.

Toronto, June 26.—Another chapter in the many legal activities concerning the estate of the late Ambrose J. Small was written at Osage Hall today when it was moved before Mr. Justice Lennox to pay the estate over to Mrs. Small, the executrix appointed by the surrogate court.

The motion was made by Ward Wright, representing the committee of the Capital Trust Company and opposed by W. R. Smythe, K.C., representing the shareholders of the Trans-Canada Theatres, Limited. Gideon Grant, K.C., representing the sisters of A. J. Small, suggested \$10,000 be paid into court for each of them, should they be considered.

Mr. Wright opposed the suggestion. On the other hand, Frank Hughes, K.C. for Mrs. Small as executrix was anxious to have all the accounts settled and squared away as quickly as possible. Mr. Smythe wanted an adjournment until after the action of Trans-Canada Theatres vs. A. J. Small was disposed of, "for if the shareholders of the theatres establish their claims they are creditors of A. J. Small."

The case is proceeding this afternoon.

STORAGE BATTERY CAR
GALT-ELMIRA BRANCH

Electric Service.

Kitchener, June 26.—The Galt-Elmira branch of the Canadian National Railways will shortly have a storage battery car running between Kitchener and Galt, as a result of continued negotiations between Sir Henry Thornton and W. D. Euler, M.P. Mr. Euler has just been advised that the purchasing department has been asked to call for tenders for a storage battery car, and as soon as the car is available it will be placed in service.

It is believed that if the service proves a success it will be extended from Galt to Elmira.

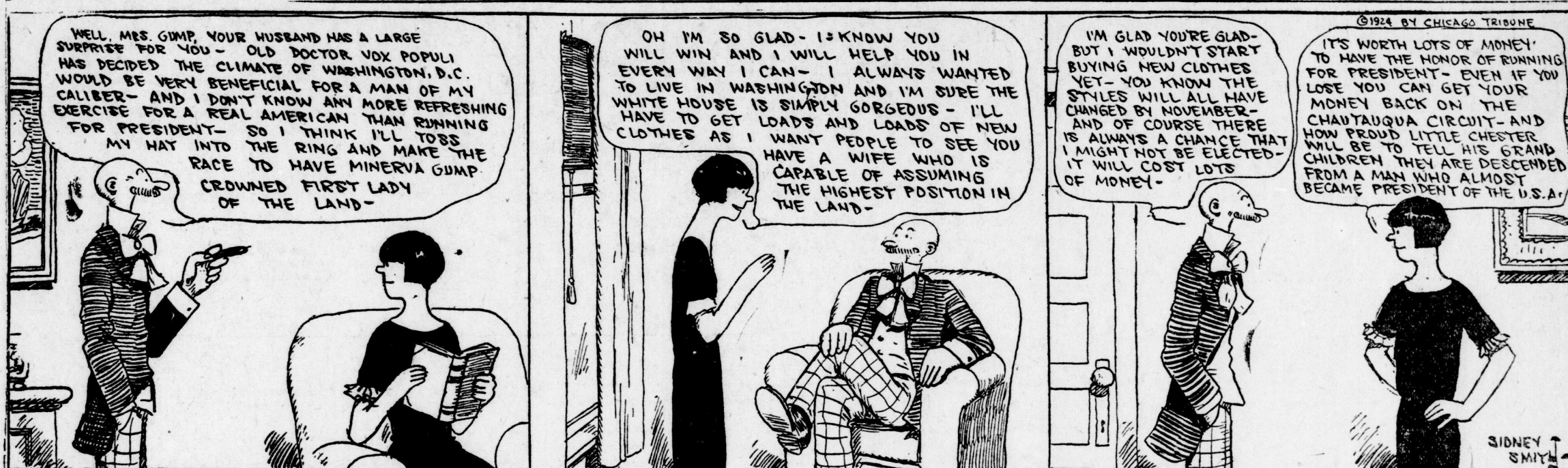
DORCHESTER W. M. S.

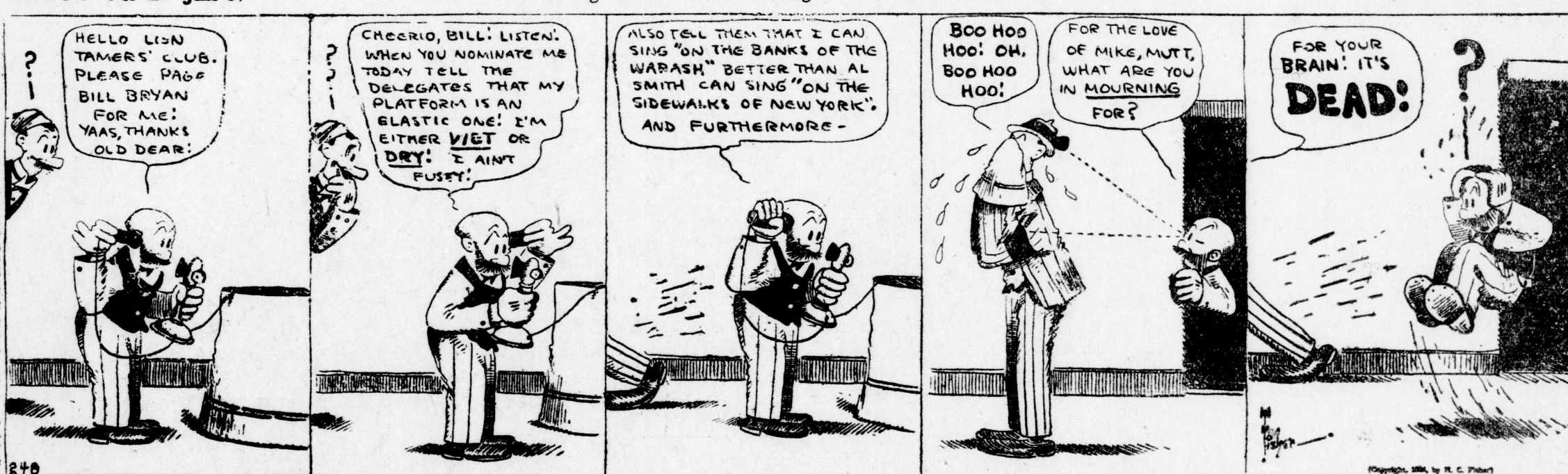
