Statistically, a crop of this size would be bullish, but sentimentally, a prospective increase of some 400,000 bales over recent private estimates has led to a readjustment of trading accounts and slow up mill demand. Nevertheless, on the break today mill interests were again good buyers, taking advantage of the lower price levels.
