John McKechnie, a young farmer, who went from Norfolk county, Ont., two weeks ago and located in Brandon district, is dead. The body will be interred at Brandon.

The double house and lot on the corner of Waterloo and Princess avenue was sold on Saturday afternoon by Mr. J. W. Jones, auctioneer, for \$4,375. The purchaser was Mr. A. E. Cooper, jeweller, of this city.

The Petrolia Advertiser says the C. W. A. meet at Kingston will be a failure, and denounces President Hill, of Kingston, for giving the casting vote in favor of his native city. All of which seems somewhat unnecessary.

Messrs. R. D. Noble and C. Mackenzie, of Petrolia, were here the other day to interview His Lordship the Bishop of Huron with the object of endeavoring to retain Rev. R. McGosh as rector of Christ Church there.

The Queen's Hotel, Winnipeg, as previously stated, has been sold to William McKenzie, the Toronto millionaire, for \$40,000. The property covered lots 1 and 3 of the Morris estate, and in 1881 was valued at \$75,000.

James Thompson's saw mill, three miles from Lynden, was destroyed by fire the other afternoon, together with 75,000 feet of oak lumber, valued at \$30 per thousand. The total loss will be about \$6,000. No insurance. The fire originated from a spark.

Squire Grace, of Brantford, has committed the man Moses, of Barford, for trial, and accepted his own bail in \$200. Moses, unlike his namesake of old, did not spoil an Egyptian, but he did his best to spoil his sister by assaulting her with an ox-yoke.

Philadelphia club men have formed an "anti-treating league." Any man who treats or accepts a treat is fined. This is the European plan and probably would do more for practical temperance, if generally adopted, than a million total abstinence lectures.

The death is announced of William Martin, well known in Vancouver in early days as a hotel-keeper. He died at Langley a week ago Thursday at the age of 58 years. He lived a number of years in the vicinity of Hespeler, Ont., where he was highly esteemed by his neighbors.

A man named Graham, of this city, was lodged in Elgin county jail Friday night, having been committed for trial by Messrs. McCall and Schliebau, J. P.'s, on a charge of stealing from Mr. Pollard's mill near West Lorne.

Kent county boasts of another centenarian in the person of Mrs. Sophia Parsons, of Raleigh township, a few miles from Chatham. She is the relict of the late Thos. Parsons, and is stated on good authority to be 105 years old.

Rev. W. J. Smith, of the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, preached a very able discourse to the congregation of Queen's Avenue Methodist Church yesterday morning.

In the evening the rev. gentleman occupied the Ashin Street Church pulpit.

There died on Friday evening at the residence of Mr. John Morris, on the 8th concession of Westminister, Miss Jane Cameron, aged 90 years. She was a native of Argyllshire, Scotland, and had been in Canada about 45 years. She was a sister of the late Archibald Cameron and of Mr. Hector Cameron, 7th concession Westminister.

Mr. Thos. Martin, Musical Director at the Helmut Ladies' College, will give a piano recital at Victoria Hall, on the evening of May 3rd, when a fine programme will be presented. The recitals given by this distinguished artist in the past have been not only highly enjoyed by cultivated musicians, but a powerful stimulus to the taste which is happily growing up amongst us for music of the best class.

The forthcoming performance should receive more than the usual attention, as it is the only public recital which will be given by Mr. Martin this season.

Mr. Minhinick, of the London Humane Society, has recently investigated a case of cruelty to cattle a few miles east of the city, which is the worst that has yet come under his notice. There was a herd of 20 young cattle in a field, all of which showed signs of impaired attendance, while in the barn there were four other cattle so weak from apparent starvation as not to be able to rise. Two veterinary surgeons were called to examine them, and on moving them out of the places where they had been resting so long it was found that the flesh was considerably festered and apparently rotting, one of the poor animals, being some all the way, and having been pronounced it the worst case of neglect they had ever witnessed.
