POINTS UPON WHICH THEY AGREE.

Washington, Aug. 30.-The course of the United States in the pending Chinese negotiations was made more embodying a communication from Russia and advising the powers of the action taken by this Government. The Russian note declared the interdiction of Li-Hung-Chang's communication with the Chinese Government was "inexplicable," and asked that the powers direct their commanders to vacate the order. The United States concurs with the position of Russia, and informs the powers that instructions have been sent to the American representative in China in the spirit of the Russian note. Following is the official text of the communication:-
