

NEW TIMBER LAND Southern Vermont Offers New Output of

100,000 Feet of Spruce Logs.

NORTH ADAMS, Mass., April 29 .- Extensive timber lands, which have been hitherto untouched are being developed his year in Southern Vermont, and the log driving operations in the Upper Deer-field valley for several years have been done away with as a result of the building of a narrow gauge railroad from Mountained Mills, extending 18½ miles into Somerset, with a branch line extend-ing one and a half miles into Glastonbury township in Vermont. The road was incorporated under the Vermont laws by the Deerfield Lumber Company, and

is exclusively for log hauling. Since the opening of the road early in the winter 100,000 feet of spruce logs have been brought daily, the mills turnday. The road taps a large area of virgin



EVACUATION OF CUBA

Self-Government for Island in September 1908, Says Taft

CINCINNATI, April 28.-That United States government will withdraw from temporary control of Cuba in September, 1908, was manifested in an inter-view by Secretary of War Taft to-day. Briefly referring to the country and his recent trip there, the secretary said that the Cuban settlement had proved so un the Cuban settlement had proved so un-expectedly satisfactory and Governor Magoon had so completely succeeded in winning the confidence of all parties there that he felt that the United States could withdraw from Cuba and give the people another opportunity for self-government not later than September, 1908.
