The authenticated particulars of the shocking tragedy at north arm "Burrard Inlet are, that on Tuesday morning, Dan-iel J. Robson and James Smith, partners in a ranche on the north arm of the Fraser, That Jeanne Marie Dubosey was found guilty by a coroner's jury at Jersey of the murder of Marie Rot, a servant in a public-house. The deceased having re-fused to serve liquor' to the accused, who was drauk, the latter set fire to her dress with a lighted newspaper. Being told yes, he dropped the knife, which Smith threw away. Walker rose up and again attacked Smith, by whom he was knocked down and fastened Walker's lege together to pre-vent his escape. LONDON, Jan. 12.—Parliament opened to-day. Large crowds congregated in the vicinity of the parliament house long be-fore the beginning of the session, and when Bradlaugh and Gladstone arrived they were loudly cheered. The values of the houses of parliament were thoroughly searched this morning, but no indications of a Guy Fawkes plot were discovered. The Rt. Hon.
