The St. Stephen Thistles defeated the Calais team 3 to 1 in a fast game of ball in St. Stephen on Saturday. Etey pitched for the Thistles and Carver for the Calais team.

The Marathons have signed on a new pitcher named Morris from New Jersey, and also Joe Donnelly, who will play first base for them. Morris comes well recommended. He will pitch for his team in Fredericton today.

Norwalk, O., June 5—Frank Van, a ball player, was struck by lightning and killed on the ball grounds yesterday. Several other players who sought shelter under a tree were shocked when a bolt struck the tree.

New York, June 4.—John J. Eller, of the Irish-American Athletic Club, the champion hurdler, lower the American record of 9 25 seconds for 75 yards over lower hurdles, by one-fifth of a second at Celtic Park today. He ran his trial and final heats in 9 15 seconds.

Newark, N. J., June 5—A baseball game yesterday between semi-professional players developed in a fatal row over a close ninth inning finish. John Cronin, aged 28 years, of Belleville, was the victim. He was stabbed in the throat and his windpipe severed. He died in an ambulance which was taking him to a hospital. Nine of the alleged participants in the row were arrested.

G. B. Dukes, of the New York Athletic Club, in the pole vault, cleared the bar at a height of 12 feet 11 inches, but as the vault was not made in actual competition the record will not hold. Dukes had won this event with an actual vault of 12 feet 4 inches. The present world's record is held by Leland S. Scott, of California, the height being 12 feet 10 7-8 inches.

New York, June 3.—A new American record for the three mile run was established by George Bonhag, the Irish-American Athletic Club at Travers Island today. Bonhag won in easy fashion and hung up new figures of 14 minutes 22 seconds for the distance, clipping 7 seconds from the record of 14 minutes 29 seconds made over twenty years ago by William Day.

HOW COLLINS AND COBB RUN BASES

In going into a base, runners differ. Cobb invariably watches the ball, says Eddie Collins, I never do. I keep my eyes glued to the man who is to receive the throw. If he is inside, I slide outside, and if he is playing back, I keep in close, making it as hard as possible for him to touch me by offering little of my body with out his reach. The fallaway slide, hooking the bag with one toe, is a big asset in keeping away from a base man. He has just one leg to touch. I will dodge up the base line to make the catcher think that I am going to steal. He asks the pitch-out and I don't go down. Then I have outguessed him, and he is getting his pitcher into a hole. At last, when the pitcher has to dish up a strike, I go down. The catcher must throw around the batter, and my chances are then much improved.

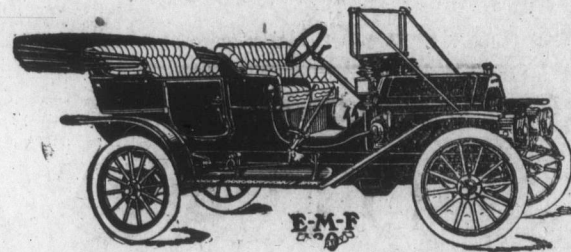

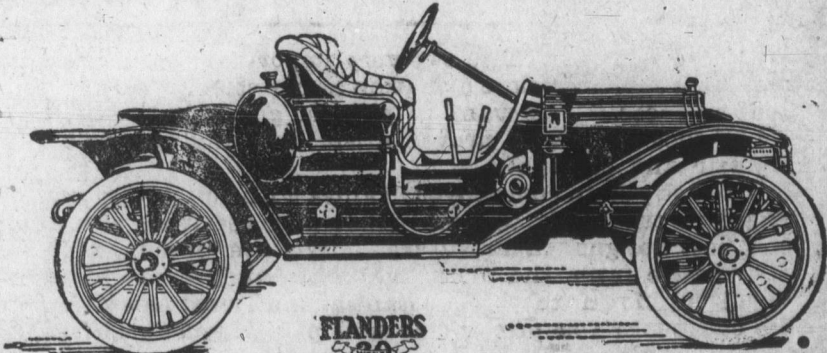
