IMPORTANT TO LAWTERS. Justice Cameron delivered a judgment of importance to the legal profession at Os-goods Hall yesterday. It was in the case of Vetter and Cowan, an action for breach of promise of marriage. Defendant was arrested on a capias on the representation of the plaintiff that he was about to leave. Ontario for the purpose of evading the con-sequences of suit. The defendant maved to set aside the order for the capias, the writ itself, and all subsequent proceedings, on the ground that the action should have been commenced by writ of summons, and the capias afterwards issued. Justice Cameron held that the power to cemmence an act by writ of capias was a right inde-pendent entirely of practice and procedure, ind which was not affected by the Judica-ture Act. Other grounds than the above were also taken in moving against the auit, but all these were in the opinion of the udge amendable, and they were waived by the defendant entering special bail. 
