FASHION FREAKS.

Some Suggestions to the Fair Sex: May to Dress. Half long mantles are used as parts of elegant costumes for day, evening, yachting, etc.

These are made of moire-plush, velvet, or of satin nearly covered with embossed figures of cloth put on like applique, cloth embroidery, and fastened near the raw edges with a satin cord.

Mantles are warmly wadded, and are trimmed with robe of chamille, and perhaps some of the new "satin jet," as modistes call the jet passementerie that has been in vogue through the season.

A dark green watered plush mantle completes a costume that is partly of the watered-plush and partly of cloth. Short mantles that are now worn in the street, though meant originally for the evening and carriage, are made of small-figured India cashmere of the rich qualities used for shawls, but of smaller patterns for the handsome wraps, and in broad showy stripes for those that are of less value.

The most elegant long cloaks are of broadest plush or velvet, with feather or flower patterns of great size and long thick pile satin ground.

Long cloaks that are now worn in the street, though meant originally for the evening and carriage, are made of small-figured India cashmere of the rich qualities used for shawls, but of smaller patterns for the handsome wraps, and in broad showy stripes for those that are of less value.

Spanish lace is most used on cloaks, but there is an effort made to revive through the use of the same purpose. The satin jets are used with lace as a heading.

Some long cloaks have plain black velvet down the front, with the back of brocade, and the large shawl bow of wide moire ribbon.

For simple long cloaks the plain plush is used in the Chinese shape that has square sleeves beginning at the elbow, and a single seam behind.

Cloth cloaks are made in the same slender shape, and are finished with a collar and a fur border if the expense is not minded, though the cloak is stylishly complete without trimming at the bottom.

In many garments the style is enhanced by having all the trimming placed lengthwise, both in front and back, rather than to show the appearance of the wearer by a crosswise border of great breadth.

For second cloaks, are inexpensive wraps made of the English homespun cloth, in dark brown colour, with red threads at intervals, or else of green cloth with mustard yellow threads.

Fewer collars are the novelty for young ladies to wear in the street. Birds of ornament on each shoulder, are handsome and green costumes.

Black velvet ribbon is revived for making bows for looping dresses, for ornamenting light dresses to give them character.

Gold beads close about the throat are still in vogue. There are also small necklets that combine gold and platinum in quaint designs, but at present the necklace is not a favourite article of jewellery, except with full dress toilettes.

Coloured stones set with diamonds are the fashion at present for the elaborate parures of jewellery that are worn on full-dress occasions.

Rubies, sapphires, emeralds, or pearls of various sizes are associated with diamonds, and in many instances stones of different colours are grouped together.

The newest finger-rings have the stones mounted in a row around the finger, though the lengthwise or diagonal arrangement of two or three still in favour.

Three rings, quite separate or else mounted together, are worn on a lady's little finger, each bearing a different set of stones.

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IMPORTANT TO LAWYERS.

Justice Cameron delivered a judgment of importance to the legal profession at Osgoode Hall yesterday. It was in the case of Vetter and Cowan, an action for breach of promise of marriage.

Defendant was arrested on a writ of habeas corpus, and the writ was granted. Justice Cameron held that the power to commit an act by writ of habeas corpus was a right independent of the writ of certiorari, and that which was not affected by the Judicature Act. Other grounds than the above were also taken in moving against the writ, but all these were in the opinion of the judge amendable, and they were waived by the defendant entering special bail.
