A TEST OF THE WINCHESTER AND SNIDER ENFIELD RIFLES.

Victory of the Suiders-The New York The above match-originally Snider Winchester, which has been creating some excitement lately, came off on the Bowmanville ranges on Saturday afternoon

At the outset the weather was fair, the At the outset the weather was fair, the sky clear, but the wind from start to finish was a "fish tail," strong and putly. Towards the conclusion of the match, however, the light changed rapidly, causing a difference of five points in the elevation from the start of the 600 yards to its finish. As a test of weapons the match did not, as everyone, even the competitors, knew beforehand, amount to much; but as affording a comparative opportunity of judging what might be done by each weapon, each in the hands of men well accustomed to them, the match is fruitful of much good.

There were represented on Saturday the following rifles: Snider, Martini, Win the following rifles: Snider, Martini, Win chester (military), Winchester (sporting), and the Hotchkiss Winchester (sporting) all with plain open sights. The ranges were 200, 500 and 600 yards, two sighting and seven scoring shots at each range, and considering the "fish-tail" gale that swept up the valley and the vapor-laden atmosphere the sheeting was remarkably good. The match proper was between the Winchester (sporting), represented by "Not a Crack Shot," and the Snider by Mr. Mitchell, but during the week Capt. S. Hughes chell, but during the week Capt. S. Hughes of Toronto, the adjutant of the Bowman ville battalion, secured the services of a gentleman, Lieut. Granam, to represent both the military Winchester and the Hethkiss Winchester, and with the consent of Mr. J. B. Mitchell and Mr. Sando had the match, Snider vs. Winchester (sporting), altered to Snider vs. Winchester (military). Although this seemingly (military). Although this seemingly placed Mr. Mitchell, the champion of the Snider, at a great disadvantage still he pluckily consented to back the Snider against any rifle. In justice, however, to Mr. Graham it must be said, that he never before fired a military Winchester and used the rifle for the first time last Saturused the rifle for the first time last Saturday. But the general opinion around Bowmanville is that he must be a very handsome man, and be armed with a very good rifle, who presents himself on the ranges in that town to do battle against the Snider. Mr. Mitchell having bravely agreed to oppose Mr. Graham, left Mr. Sando the champion of the Winchester (anorting), and a gentleman more accus (sporting), and a gentleman more accustomed to drop a deer on the bound, or a fox on the run than to pepper at an old can vas target to oppose Lieut. W. S. Russell of the 45th ba talion." Further, to lend interest to the day's proceedings, as well as to test the rifes, Sargeon McLaughlin and Sergt. J. B. King (both of the same ba talion) fired the Martini and Snider re-

spectively, while Lieut Graham and Bandsman Nowell tested the Hotchkiss, Vinchester and Snider respectively.

In the opinion of the competitors the points worthy of consideration are that taken all in all the Scider is ahead of any other as a military rifle; that the Martini, with a few improvements; would make a better one; that for sporting or military purposes where magazine guns might be used, as in guerilis or Indian fighting, or for cavalry purposes the Winchester and the Hotchkiss would be invaluable. The Winchester (military) requires as little windage as the Martin, if not less than it does. This partly accounts for the comparatively small scores

made with the military Winchester. Its trajectory is much lower than the Snider, and of course the ballet speeds on its way more rapidly. Had the rifle been properly tested as to elevation, etc., beforehand there is no doubt it would have shown better results. shown better results.

The Hotchkiss, however, was admitted by all to be the superior weapon. It can be used as a single fire, the magazine being easily kept in reserve; while its extreme simplicity and durability of action render

its liability to become unserviceable nil.


