TWO HUNDRED STREET CAR DRIVERS AND CONDUCTORS OF STRIKE.

The epidemic of labor demands recognition—car traffic has been suspended—The company executives, at a stake—The street car troubles are not over. Hon. Frank Smith was interviewed at a late hour last night. He stated that the company proposes starting their cars this morning on all the lines. They expect the city to protect them, to keep the streets clear from obstructions and to make good any damage they may sustain. The company are not importing outside talent to replace the old hands. The story of the 300 French Canadian "seabs" being brought on that way, is a fabrication of whole cloth. He did, however, decidedly object to the affairs of his company being administered by a committee of the Knights of Labor sitting in secret session in the streets of the city. As the men themselves admitted, they were not striking for higher pay or shorter hours, and he was determined to oppose them in their endeavor to fix Knights of Labor control on him.

An attempt was made to obtain from some of the men information as to their intentions. All were mum on the point. They volunteered the information that they were not only to maintain the present principles that all men have a right to sell themselves in the market of organized labor. FIGHTING THE KNIGHTS.

ALL OF THEM DISCLOSED BY THE MISSOURI PACIFIC.

St. Louis, March 10.—Superintendent Kerfoot, of the Missouri Pacific railway, has issued an order, expelling from the Pacific yards all Knights of Labor. The order states that the names of the Knights have been obtained from the records of the company. It is generally believed that the company are now employing new men to take the places of the strikers and that the movement of freight trains will be attempted to-night. Should this prove true, the Knights of Labor will undoubtedly offer resistance.
