TORONTO.

Trade was brisk at the City Cattle Market to-day as the demand showed considerable improvement. A number of buyers from Montreal were on the market, and this, with the brisk buying of the butchers, cleaned up the market early in the day. Prices were generally strong, especially for good butcher cattle. The run amounted to 69 cars, and included 1,157 cattle, 668 sheep and lambs, 358 hogs and 112 calves.

Export cattle were in good demand, but heavy cattle were hard to get; \$5 is quoted for choice stock, and good cattle have no trouble at all in getting this price. The general run of exporters offering to-day were rather light in weight, selling from \$4.65 to \$4.75. Export bulls were firm, selling from \$3.75 to \$4 for the best.

Butcher cattle of all grades found a ready sale today, and prices have a firm tone. Choice were selling from \$4.30 to \$4.40 and picked cattle 10c. to 15c. more. Local butchers were buying freely, and there is a firmer tendency in prices as the buyers to-day were unable to get cattle enough to satisfy their demands. Stockers and feeders are of course, very quiet, and, although there is still some demand for heavy cattle, there are very few of them to be had. Light stockers are not wanted. Milch cows and calves are steady.

Sheep and lambs have a firmer tone. Hogs are 25c lower to-day, at \$6.65 for choice selects, and \$6.40 for lights and fats.
