Toronto, Feb. 27.—The heavy gale prevailing throughout the country has demoralized the market this morning. The run is so light in all classes that it is hardly worth calling a market. A few good butchers sold at \$6 to \$6.25, but almost everything else went under that price. Sheep and lambs prices are unchanged, with hardly anything offering. Hogs are slightly firmer, being now \$6.85 fed and watered, and \$6 50 f.o.b.

The expenses, including all those incurred in conducting the farm and maintaining the family were about \$2,500. Interest was allowed upon an investment of \$15,000 at 6 per cent, and the final summing up showed the farmer and his wife received \$1,000 net for their labor during the year. Lent in New York.
