EXTRACTS FROM THE JOURNALS.

February 5.

Mr. Beardsley, a member for the County

of Carleton, brought under the consideration

of the House a question of Privilege, and in

doing so, stated that an action had been in-

stituted against him, one of the Attorneys of

Province, at the suit of George Jarvis (Dib-

blee; that a copy of the Bill, purporting to

have been filed in the office of the Clerk of

that Court, and under an envelope, had been

delivered to him on Saturday last, when he

placed on the floor of this House, by Wil-

liam Payne, one of the door-keepers, and a

servant of this House; and that he, the said

William Payne, had stated to him, Mr.

Beardsley, that he was aware of the contents

and purport of the said document at the time

of its being so delivered; whereupon On mo-

tion of Mr. Egan, Resolved, That William

Payne, one of the servants of this House,

by serving a declaration on Bartholomew

rew Ramsford be refused to answer the

questions propounded to him by the Speaker,

and thereupon Resolved, That he be com-

mitted to the common Gaol, in the County of

York, and to stand committed during the

pleasure of the House. The House then

adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10

o'clock.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY.

SAINT ANDREWS.

Saint Andrews is situated upon a penin-

sula on the east side of the mouth of the

St. Croix, which at its entrance is four

miles long, and is composed of new red

sandstone, covered with beds of clay, grav-

el, sand, and marl. The sandstone also

forms Nary Island at the entrance of the

river, and extends in a westerly direction into

the American State of Maine. The course

of this formation is from the north-east, to

the south-west; the general dip of the strata

is to the south-east, at an angle of 15°

from the horizon; but wherever the rocks
