Bridgetown Schools among the Best in the Province

Bright Prospects for the Coming Year for Bridgetown Students.—Names of Pupils Passing Provincial Examination—Entire B. Class Successful in Obtaining Certificates.

After seven weeks vacation the Bridgetown School opened again on Monday with the following staff of teachers:—
Principal, Miss Annie Fellows.
High School Classes, Principal H. L. Bastin.
Preparatory, Miss Laura Whitman.
Intermediate, Miss Annie Fellows.
2nd Primary, Miss Nettie Bishop.
1st Primary, Miss Winnie Boyd.
Each department has enrolled its full quota of students and it is generally remarked by observant citizens of the students passing daily, to and from school that a brighter and more promising set could hardly be assembled in any town in the province. Bridgetown has reason to be proud of its coming generation and to expect good and useful citizenship from them, and the students should appreciate the advantages their town offers them in educational privileges.

The school building, built but a few years ago, spacious, well equipped and adequate in every particular, has been thoroughly cleaned and made wholesome and attractive during the vacation. The grounds in which the school building is set with grove, lawn, flower beds and fountain, are calculated to inspire a love of order and beauty, which should be a part of the practical education of all young lives. The pupils are under the guidance and authority of a set of

instructors selected with a care for moral and ethical fitness as well as teaching efficiency, and it is confidently expected that the coming year will be marked by a progress not yet excelled. Principal Bastin is to be congratulated on the results of the provincial examination of his B. class, every member of which was successful in securing the B certificate. Correspondence

To the Editor of the Monitor:—
On August 21st, the ladies of Hampton held their annual S. S. picnic on the grounds of Mr. E. Chute; when by lucky chance the writer happened to be in the village, and was invited to attend. Although a stranger, I found myself at home among as pleasant and warm-hearted a company of people as I ever met. The tables being spread I sat down to tea, one of thirty-eight, which was only one-third of the entire number. Your readers may be interested to know that the planet Mars, which can be seen at nine o'clock in the evening due south about fifteen degrees above the horizon, is nearer to us than it has been for fifteen years. In 1892, it was less than thirty-six million miles from the earth. Its mean distance is forty-five million miles from the earth and one hundred and forty-one miles from the sun. From observations made by astronomers in 1892, it was thought that Mars was inhabited and that they were signalling the earth. In 1877, Asaph Hall, of the Washington Observatory, found that Mars has two moons which can be seen with the naked eye by placing a mirror so that it will reflect the planet.
