L. D. Shaffner returned last week from a fine winter in the West Indies and Southern States.

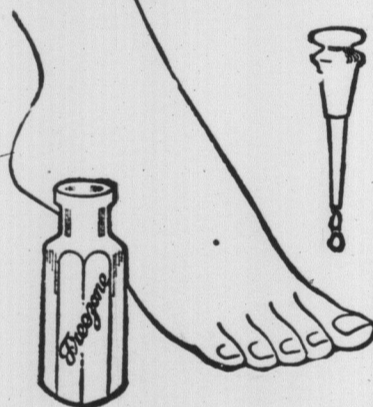
Mrs. Dan Owen and Capt. Parish Owen have been on a trip to Montreal to meet Major Dan.

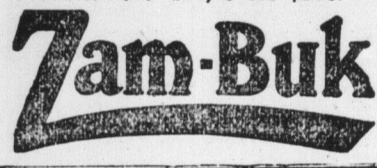

BRIDGE SWEEP AWAY AT BRATTLEBORO, VT

The fresh waters of the Connecticut river, swollen into a raging torrent by melting ice and snow and sweeping huge cakes of ice on it, crest, swept away the iron suspension bridge spanning the river at Brattleboro, Vt., carrying with it Cornelius Flanagan, 75 who was crossing to his home. The structure was about 200 feet long and 32 feet wide, and was used for vehicular traffic and pedestrians only. It was built in 1903 at a cost of \$35,000 and connected the town with an island.
