Phrenology

As a Science. By the Editor. CHAPTER I.

ASSING along the street in the city of Guelph where I had been lecturing a short time since, I heard two men in conversation upon the subject of phrenology; one claiming it to be an established science, and the other denying that it had any scientific foundation whatever.
