The Daily Chronicle publishes the following telegram from its Rome correspondent: The Pope since beginning his customary sojourn in the gardens of the Vatican has continued his usual occupations in the Palazzo adjoining the tower of St. Peter.

On July 7th the twenty-fifth anniversary of the elevation of Archbishop MacDonald, of St. Andrews and Edinburgh, to the priesthood, and a special Mass of thanksgiving was celebrated in the Catholic Cathedral.

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Attachment to the Holy See. Rome, July 16.—A letter from the Pope to Cardinal Oreglia di San Stefano, Dean of the Sacred College, was published to-day. His Holiness thanks the bishops who assembled at the recent canonizations, and signed an address declaring their attachment to the Holy See.
