While on the subjects of telescopes it is well to remark that at Wimbledon they are used by every one and there is no just reason why we in Canada should not be allowed their aid to make scores equally as good as are made there. The Montreal, Brockville or Toronto Clubs would have been most happy to let all have the benefit of having the exact position of each hit or miss recorded, and it is to be hoped next year we may have a more liberal rule in this respect.
