## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

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The weck preceding the date of a general 1) om:mion election is always a quiet one in business cincles. The political campangn which has just cuded, and which has resulted in plicung the Liberal party in power, will settle matters in this respect for a few years at least, and commerce should now resume its normal condaion. Thas, it is hoped, will assist in improving the lumber trade, which is greatly in need of a reviral. The condition 0 .' white pine cannot be satid to show any improvement. Only the better grades are in demand, it being difficult to effect sales of common stock even at a very low figure. No one seems to be actually in need of pine, and consequently consumers are holding off until election matters are setted and commerce has resumed its usual course before placing orders. In hardwoods the situation is a little different. There is a fair number of inquiries, and manufacturers could dispose of stock at current prices quite freely. Jut many of the mills are asking for an advance ranging from 50 cents to $\$ 1.50$ per thousiand feet, and this has prevented some sales. Several wholesale dealers state that in the case of stocks Which they have handled for years they are asked to pay the advance above mentioned, while the consumer is unwilling to pay a higher price for his lumber. This may eventually result, however, in increased values. The seneral tone of the hardwood market is firm, there being some trade from the United States, while of the woods whicn are scarce the supply is not equal to requirements. Among these are white maple and dry oak.
gurnic aNi) New brusswick.
The spruce lumber of Quebec and New Brunswick is meeting with ready consumption in Great Britain. Irices have been well maintained, shippers realizing a marked advance over last year's figures. It is now more than probable that no de cline in values will occur this season, and unless there is an over-production, induced as a result of the firm market, still betier prices may be obtained. Charters for steamers for July and August are being made at a higher rate than for any previous monti of the year. Shipments from Montreal last week were large, and ate sradually reducing the stock in the hands of manufacturers. This will mean that the new cut will meet with it ready demand when placed upon the market.
hoitisit col.unbia and manitoba.
There has been it falling off of late in the demand for lumber for foreign ship-
ment from Bitish Columbia. The local market, however, has maintained its stiength, whle to the eastern provinces of the I)ominion there have been heavy ship. ments. This is encouraging in the face of the present unsetled condition of the country as a testld of the recent elections. In Manitoba there is little life exhibited by the trade, buildine being guiet. Crop prospects, on the other hand, ale considered fatorable.

## usiten stidis.

The month of June thus far shows the arixegate colume of lumber sold to be about equal to the sales of the sume month last year, although trale is as yet very restricted. It must be satd, however, that a better feeling exists among lumbermen, and reports from leading distributing points are indicative of a better trade. In the northenn states, where the output of white pine is being curtailed, there will not be the surplus of low grades which have in former years tended to keep prices down. From i)uluth the shipments for the past week were above the averase, and the market is thought to be steadily gaining strenglh. Reports abo state that crops are in an excellent condicion, and these would seemi to be vertied by the demand which is being experienced for barn stock and repair material. The eastern trade is not in as healthy condition as it was some weeks ago. More difficulty is found in disposing of lumber, notwithstanding that bulding operations are of an average volume. The local and the Canadian product is meeting with less favor than the Southem wood, yet the call on the supply does not satisfy manufacturers of the latter, who will make an effort $t 0$ restrict production. Dlain sawed red oak leads among the hardwoods, and the supply of dry stock is scarcely mectins the requirements. More business could be done in hardwoods if there were more good stocks to be obtained, but dry stock is scarce and here is little of the new cut which is in a fit condation to market. There is also some call for inch red oak. Birch has lost strength of late, and meets with little ingury. In the west the accumulation of red celar shinsiles is said to be so great that the mills will probably be closed down for a period. The lacific coast trade as a whole partikes of dullness.

A comparison of the inports of wook goods into Great Britain is indicative of the bealthy condition which has characterized the lumber trade of that country of late. During the month of May the inlports were 602,000 loads, as against $470,-$
