The Mending of Lace.

This is an art of itself, and many propart is made new by working the pate production over. If possessed of really beautiful lace I would say, "send it to a professional. If an ordinary piece tears, mend it with face thread, which comes in small soft balls at five to ten cents, imitating the groundwork mesh to the best of your ability. Before taking a stitch baste the face on a piece of embroidery, leather or stiff paper, otherwise it will be drawn out of shape and distorted by puckers. 
