Mr. Knowles:

For a copy of all directives and instructions issued to unemployment insurance offices since January 1949, having to do with the handling of unemployment, including ways and means of dealing with applications for unemployment insurance benefits; advice as to the meaning of the words "suitable employment"; any special directives or instructions with reference to displaced persons, and any other related matters.

Mr. Cote (Verdun-La Salle): Before the question is put, Mr. Speaker, I wish to remind

the house that this motion, in principle, would be objectionable as being against the rules of the house, since it refers to the production of departmental papers. But upon reading it, hon. members will realize that it refers to instructions and directives from the unemployment insurance commission to the field staff of the commission, which instructions would fall in the category of public papers. I therefore wish to waive any objection and to allow the motion to pass, now that this explanation has been made.

Mr. Knowles: Thank you.

UNEMPLOYMENT-REPORTS TO UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE COMMISSION

Mr. Knowles:

For a copy of all reports made to the unemployment insurance commission and/or to the Minister or deputy minister of Labour, dated since September 1949, having to do with the unemployment situation.

Mr. Cote (Verdun-La Salle): I should have liked to adopt the same attitude with regard to this motion, Mr. Speaker, but unfortunately it is impossible to waive any objection here. These are departmental papers of a strictly privileged character, and should be treated as such. On that ground I respectfully submit that this motion is out of order.

Mr. Knowles: May I ask the parliamentary assistant a question? Would the motion be acceptable to the government if the words "and/or to the Minister or deputy minister of Labour" were deleted? That would leave the motion asking simply for reports made to the unemployment insurance commission itself.

Mr. Cote (Verdun-La Salle): If I may, Mr. Speaker, I should like to request the privilege of giving an analysis of what is involved in this request for an order of the house for the production of these papers.

Reports having to do with the unemployment situation coming to the Minister or deputy minister of Labour which are prepared and made from time to time fall into the following categories:

- 1. Reports by officers or committees of the Department of Labour for the purpose of advising the minister on these matters: They are in the same category as other memoranda prepared within the department for the use of the minister, and are therefore privileged.
- 2. Statistical data on local employment office operations relating to unplaced applicants, benefit claims filed, referrals to employment, etc.: They are forwarded at regular intervals from the employment service offices in the field for use by the economics and research branch of
