

## Considerable Aftermath to Saturday's Rugby Games

### SATURDAY'S FINAL FOR RUGBY HONORS

Tigers and T. R. and A. A. for the Dominion Championship — Rugby Gossip.

T. R. and A. A. came back from Hamilton in a badly-crushed condition, but they were able to trot out every man, including George Bickle, against the Tigers on Saturday at Varsity Stadium, in the Dominion final. Sammy Manson should get real opposition from Bickle, as the latter has shown he is able to kick with any of them in the two games he has played in this year. If Bickle lives up to his form, the Tigers will find the black and white squad no mean opponents. Their line is as good as any in the country, and only the back division has been responsible for the failures to date.

In the laudable rivalry among sporting clubs as to which has the honor of having sent the most members to the front, probably the Capitals of Toronto deserve the credit. This is an organization of lads who play lacrosse, hockey and rugby football. It boasts at its height of around 200 members. It also boasts, rather modestly, of having sent between 140 and 150 of its members to fight the battles of the country. The Capitals have a limited clubroom, where they assemble occasionally, but for playing grounds they are dependent entirely upon public spaces, and in the few years of their existence they have won a score of championships—city, provincial and national. They have won the Toronto City League senior championship since its inception, but their latest performance was to win the Canadian Rugby Junior championship in 1912. They are simply an aggregation of working boys, seeking neither patronage nor celebrity, but playing their modest way and playing entirely for sport, all their games taking place in the open. Talk about amateurism! The Capitals come nearer to being the Simon-pure than any combination known. Even club chieftains are to them a dream. Can the senior members of the Rugby Union say that much—the Argonauts, the Hamilton Tigers, the Ottawas and the Monarchs, with their paid professional coaches and trainers? CORNWALL, Nov. 15.—The future of a young member of the Cornwall lacrosse team was cut rather short so far as lacrosse playing is concerned when John Denny had his left arm badly mangled at the Toronto Paper Co. mill here this afternoon while working on a paper machine.
