Was this an Answer which ought to have fatisfied a M——r; and yet on this he has all along rested, though things continued as justly to be complained of as before; and though Lord Albermarle faid he would examine the two Men which came to Paris, in order to support their receiving Satisfaction, was it ever done? It was not. And the Reason for it was, that our M-r at home, by means of the French Ambaffador in London, had obtained, as a Request, the Release of these three Men, and given up all Claim to the Effects and other Things which were mentioned in the Memorial. Wherefore Lord Albermarle, in consequence of Orders, defisted from endeavouring to obtain an Indemnification for the British Subjects.

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Now, Sir, will an unprejudiced Man believe, in consequence of what you have laid down, and of the M——r's Letters, unauthenticated, that the Prisoners were discharged in compliance to a Demand, which has never been complied with in the other Particulars depending on the same Cause of Complaint against French Injustice? or from what I have said, and the French Manifesto sign'd by their M——rs, unreply'd to by the Court of England, that the Releasement
