### AT KALAMAZOO

KALAMAZOO, July 19.—The final day of the Grand Circuit meet here was characterized by its long card of five races and the difficulty experienced in nearly every heat in getting the starters away. As a result the last heat was raced when it was almost too dark to see across the field.

Dorah Medium won first money in the 224 trot, which was carried over from yesterday, having the best standing after five hotly contested heats, in which none of the ten starters was able to win three heats.

Dudley Archdale won the free-for-all trot in straight heats, but had to trot the fastest mile of the year—2:08 1/4—to beat Billy Burke in the first heat. The finish in this round was so close that only the judges could decide the winner.

Vernon McKinney, favorite in the free-for-all pace, lost the first heat, but took the next two with ease. Sir R. won the first heat and was looked upon as a dangerous opponent for McKinney in the second heat, but he was frightened by a horse which broke from its harness and ran onto the track. The mishap caused Sir R. to break badly and he was distanced.

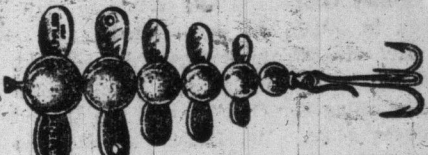
