Heavyweight Boxer Must Go Thru With Contract Made for | PENNY ANTE--Three Years.

New York, Dec. 18.—Justice Geigerich in the supreme court here today upheld a three-year contract between Jack Dempsey the heavyweight puglilist and John Reisler, giving to the latter exclusive control of Dempsey's boxing contests and exhibitions clusive control of Dempsey's boxing contests and exhibitions.

Reisler brought suit to compel performance of the contract on Dempsey's part. Denying a botion by the fighter's counsel to dismiss the complaint, the court held that the agreement, under which Dempsey was to appear exclusively under Reisler's management until December, 1919, was legal inasmuch as it was made when boxing and sparring contests were legal in New York if conducted under the rules of the State Athletic Association.

Reisler alleged that Dempsey had refused to live up to his part of the contract. Justice Geigerich allowed the fighter 20 days to file an answer to the complaint.

Baseball Outlook in Western Canada Best

Vancouver, R.C., Dec. 18.—Former Pacific Coast International League stars are planning an invasion of cities in the middlewest next spring, according to Jimmy Hamilton, former manager of the Vancouver Club. In a letter to a Vancouver friend, Hamilton states that there is every assurance that the Western Canada League will operate next season, and he has decided to accept a barth on that circuit. He states that Eill Hurley, former manager of Saskatoon, will return to the Twilight League, while Pete Standridge, former big-leaguer, figures on landing a managerial berth with the Calgary club, "I believe that the Western Canada League will develop into one of the best minor league organizations in the country," writes Hamilton. "We are in a position to line-up some strong teams for Calgary Edmonton, Saskatoon, Red Deer, Winnipeg and other cities on the circuit.
