Biggar for Cataract.

By the casting vote of Mayor Biggar, the board of works' recommendation, that some 100 electric street lights supplied by the Cataract Company at \$2.50 per light be cut off and natural gas lamps at \$2.50 a lamp be substituted, was referred back.

Ald. Church declared that the Cataract Power Company controlled the council and could get anything it liked. This company is willing to supply Normal lamps, manufactured by the Canadian Westinghouse Company, at \$2.40 a lamp.

It was agreed that a special meeting of the city council should be held this week to deal with the mountain drain problem. The city engineer says that about \$12,000 will have to be spent on it at once.

The finance committee will be asked to consider the advisability of submitting a bylaw to the ratepayers next January, asking them to vote \$20,000 for a home for incurables.
