

SHRIMPS--From the Gulf of Mexico, 15c and 30c a Tin. Kingston, Feb.24.-After three months' illness His Grace Archbishop Cleary died shortly after noon to-day. On Feb. 12 Dr. Ryan succeeded in getting the aged prelate to take a drive, and that was his last appearance in the open air. A day or two later he had to take to his bed, and grew weaker from day to day, being able to take none but liquid nourishment. On Monday he became subject to nausea, and the constant retching greatly enfeebled him. Tuesday afternoon he grew faint and soon after passed into a semi-conscions state. He was aware on Monday that the change was for the worse, and declined medicine. He said he did not want to torture himself in view of the approaching dissolution. Mgr. Farrelly, Vicar-Generals Gauthier and Kelly, with nurses, were at his side at the last. He died peacefully.

At litteen years of age, having completed the English and classical curriculum of studies in the Dungaryan school, he was sent by his parents to Rome for his ecclesiastical education. Pope Gregory XVI, then wore the tiara; and Dr. Cullen, subsequently Cardinal Archbishop of Dublin, was rector of the Irish College in Rome, this being an exclusively ecclesiastical seminary, in which every Catholic Bishop in Ireland had the right of placing a certain number of pupils. The Bishop of Waterford, to whom James Vincent Cleary was subjected, recalled the latter from Rome, and placed him in the Royal College of Maynooth. Here he passed five years in the pursuit of ecclesiastical eciences. Philosophy, history, dogmatic and moral theology, scriptural exegesis and canon laws constituted the curriculum. He won the highest prizes at the college in each department of study. His course in Maynooth having been completed in five years, he received the order of deaconship, which bound him irrevocably to the ecclesiastical state, and he returned home to Dungarvan in June, 1851, heigh still too young to be admitted. he returned home to Dungarvan in June, 1851, being still too young to be admitted to the priesthood. In the following September, the day after he had completed his twenty-third year, which is the prescribed age, he was ordained priest in his

native town, at the hands of the Bishop of Waterford, and immediately proceed-ed to Spain, where he entered the famous University of Salamanca.
In 1854 he was summoned home by In 1854 he was summoned home by his bishop to occupy the chair of dogmatic theology and scriptural exegesis in St. John College, Waterford. Soon his health gave way under the strain of excessive labor, and for some years he was compelled to relax his studies. In 1863, after three days' public examination, the degree of D.D. was conferred upon him. Ten years after this Dr. Cleary was appointed to the office of president of the Waterford College, and also filled the nost of doctrinal exposipresident of the Waterford College, and also filled the post of doctrinal expositor in the cathedral of Waterford. In 1876 he was promoted to the living of Dungarvan, his native parish. It was then that Dr. Cleary first took any part in politics. He deemed it part of his duties to direct and control his parishioners in the discharge of what he propounded as a high conscientious obligation, the honest exercise of the suffrage. His teaching on the grave criminality of giving or accepting bribes in exchange for suffrage attracted attention all over Ireland.
