There were seven persons in the galleries. The bill passed the second reading, as also did that of the Attorney-General to amend the law with respect to compensation to workmen. There was no explanation or discussion at this stage.

The "spraying official," Mr. Orr, was stated by Mr. Wardell to be a useless appendage to the department, for the farmers and fruit-growers could do this work themselves. Mr. Auld (South Essex) and Mr. S. Russell (East Hastings) were of the contrary opinion.

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Horse Doctors' Bill.

In the Legal Committee of the Legislature yesterday Mr. German's bill to make veterinary surgeons a close corporation came up, and Hon. Mr. Dryden advised that it be thrown out because it would greatly inconvenience farmers. It will stand till Monday and so will Mr. Russell's bill regarding the engineers. Mr. Stratton's bill to provide for short forms of leases, Mr. Brower's to provide for security for costs in actions for injury on the public highway and Mr. Hodgins' to put a lien on past iring stock so as to enable the farmer to obtain his pasture money, were all thrown out. The principle of Mr. Foy's bill in regard to sureties was endorsed by the committee, but a wish was expressed to see the form of bond, so final action was deferred. York and Ontario Counties.

Half an hour was spent over the trouble between the Counties of York and Ontario regarding the approaches to the Rouge River bridge. The Private Bills Committee had recommended a settlement by which York County would pay \$1500 to Ontario County. Hon. Mr. Dryden (S. Ontario) moved that the amount be made \$2000, and was supported by Mr. Hoyle (N. Ontario). Mr. Hill (W. York) and Hon. Mr. Davis (N. York) claimed that \$1500 was enough. On a vote, the clause remained as it stood, viz., \$1500, by an overwhelming majority. The bill passed as amended.

A Proposed Railway Extension via Guelph Which Will Benefit Toronto.

A petition is being circulated in Goderich, Guelph and the municipalities between these points to secure an extension of the C.P.R. from Campbellville to Goderich. The petition is addressed to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and reads as follows:

The petition of the undersigned, representing the city of Guelph, the town of Goderich and the different municipalities lying on or near the proposed route of the Canadian Pacific Railway between the city of Guelph and the town of Goderich, humbly showeth:

1. That in the year 1887-88 the city of Guelph constructed, at a cost of over \$200,000, a railway* line between the said city of Guelph and the Credit Valley Division, C.P.R., at a point near the village of Campbeliville, upon the understanding that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company would continue the said line to connect with the navigation of the upper lakes at the town of Goderich.

2. That in the year 1896 the Dominion Government granted to the said railway company a renewal of the charter for this line for five years upon condition that the line should be in operation before the expiry of this time.

3. That the said line has not been continued to the town of Goderich, because the harbor at Goderich has not been made deep enough to admit the largest vessels on the lake, but there is reason to believe that the C.P.R. may be induced to let the contracts for the construction of this line so soon as the Canadian Pacific Railway Company receive a sufficient assurance that the necessary improvements will be speedily made to Goderich harbor to provide an outlet for through freight to the west.

4. That the open water route to Goderich from the west has the advantage of any route upon the Georgian Bay in risk to navigation, insurance rates and cost of transportation by rail to Toronto from Goderich harbor to provide an outlet for through freight to the west.

5. That it is believed that the actual cost of transportation by rail to Toronto from Goderich harbor to provide an outlet for about thirty-five miles is so steep that t


