THE STORM STRUCK BUFFALO.

A Number of Persons Were Hart and Much Damage to Property

The U. S. Contention. The contention maintained by the Ameri-can authorities all along is that the bound-ary line should be placed so as to place in American territory the strip of territory which is given to Russia by the treaty of 1225, beyond and above all head water. 
