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DON'T AGREE WITH MR. WEBB

Toronto Packing House Managers Consider His Figures Greatly Exaggerated.

BY-PRODUCTS OF SLAUGHTER USED

American Methods Are Not Superior to Those in Vogue in Canada.
The other day Mr. Andrew Webb, an English cattle dealer, who is at present visiting this country, rather startled the community by asserting that Canada is losing \$2,000,000 a year by not making proper use of the guts, tripe, liver, etc., of slaughtered animals.

Now we are given to understand that Mr. Webb is a big factor in the English meat business, and what he says is therefore the more interesting. In conversation with 'The World' on Thursday Mr. Webb dilated upon his former contention, pointing out that big fortunes are being made in England by firms who handle nothing but the offal of slaughtered cattle, and maintained that a Canadian company established for the purpose would succeed abundantly.

Figures Largely Exaggerated.
The Toronto packing house proprietors and managers are inclined to resent the views expressed by Mr. Webb. The manager of one of the largest abattoirs in Toronto was interviewed on the subject. He ridiculed the statements of Mr. Webb and asserted that his figures were so largely exaggerated that, if they were true, every Canadian packing house would be bankrupt.

It can be accepted as an original proposition that Canadian packing houses are operated on the most economical and scientific principles. It is not possible for the business to be carried on at all, any more is the margin of profit. Talk about losing trade! The idea is preposterous and makes the person responsible for such a statement perfectly amiable among those familiar with the situation. The trade would not permit the packer to make so much as a \$1.48 profit on one carcass, to say nothing of wasting that amount and then being able to make a profit sufficient to keep in business. As a matter of fact we lose nothing but the squeal of a pig and the liver and tripe and intestines that they do in England in preparation of the price of meat generally in our countries. It has been the custom, however, in England, to use the offal to interfere with, to give to the purchaser of each carcass in the city where a packing house is established, the liver of the animal.

Sell Livers and Hearts.
The livers and hearts of those carcasses shipped out of the city, of course sell and get as high a price as the market will bear. In the section from which Mr. Webb comes we could sell five hundred more livers and hearts than he could handle in his house in Chicago. Any methods of the Chicago packing houses which we find an improvement over ours are instantly copied. Then, too, we know all about the Canadian packers can do in the live meat trade of Europe. We have tried it and we know more about the business in Canada than Mr. Webb can hope to tell us. In the first place the American packers admit themselves that they only ship dead meat to Europe to dispose of the surplus and to keep the home market evenly balanced. Mr. Webb claims the same excuse for we have a home market for the full capacity of our plants. One must consider the necessary difference in the volume of the packing house business here and in the United States. At the same time they have no labor-saving device or economic system that does not obtain right here in Toronto.

Business Done on Close Margin.
Among men familiar with the intricacies of the trade it is no secret that the packing house business is done on an exceedingly close margin, and no wonder would remain in business who wasted a cent's worth of offal or other products of the slaughtered animal. The idea of Mr. Webb's talking about the tripe being another article that would trade in Canada! A man who has been recognized as commercially valuable in Canada for a quarter of a century would be considered a fool. With the most skillful American packers working in Canadian plants, how would it be possible for such a difference in the methods, as Mr. Webb claims, to continue? The only difference in the United States packing plants and those of Canada is the difference between the capacity of eighty millions of people and ten millions. Scientific and economically the handling of packing is done in an up-to-date manner. It can be taken for granted that when we send our refuse to the fertilizing department all the substance of a commercial value, along other lines has been exhausted.

British Journalists Here To-Day.
To-day the representative British journalists who have been touring Canada under the guidance of W. T. R. Preston, Dominion Immigration Agent in London, will visit Toronto, and will be entertained in an official and also by the civic reception committee.
