

Still it is not so long since the Pacific scandal was the chief topic of the day; and since that time there have been scores of others. Indeed, they were so common at one time as to at-tract the serious attention of the Brit-ish press to the character of our pub-lic life and the methods of our public men. But it is curious how many people are working hard to forget just now the great political offences of the past, and to get themselves into a state of virtuous indignation over some incidents of the present. We do not say this to minimize the gravity of such so-called disclosures as those of Mr. Gamey, and what they would in-dicate if true.
