Warsaw, June 25.-The proclamation issued yesterday by the Social Democratic party of Poland and Lithuania, calling out workmen as a protes against the Lodz massacre, declares emperor's government," all Warsaw must stop work to-morrow. The prociamation orders that not a single factory or workshop shall be operated and that offices, shops, restaurants and coffee-houses must close and all traffic must cease. Beginning of Bloodshed. Rioting commenced last night. Gen. darmes charged a crowd and infantry patrols fired two volleys. Three men were wounded. The crowd was also armed and fired upon the troops. A secret police agent was stabbed. Processions were formed at 6 o'clock and marched with red flags down Grsybow-ska-street. At Wrenia-street a mounted patrol crossed the procession and one of the marchers threw a bomb, which exploded and wounded two gendarmes. The man who threw the missile escaped. Simultaneously there was another demonstration by persons carrying a red flag at Leschno, but there was no blood shed.

The situation here, with a majority of the workmen striking, the walkout threatening to become general and the working class inflamed by the news of Rioting commenced last night. Gen. sacks were killed. One of the latter

The strike was ordered by the social revolutionary committee as a demonstration to affect the trial of Stephen Okrjeia, the locksmith who threw a bomb into the Praga police station on March 26, injuring six policemen, and his conviction and sentenced to death today has still further enraged the revolutionary leaders.

Twelve thousand persons have already left and all trains are crowded. During the disturbances 35 government liquor stores were destroyed by the mob, who appropriated all the cash and stamps found on the premises, which they added to the funds of the Socialist party. CIVIL WAR AT LODZ.

Nothing approaching the disorders at Lodz on Friday, which passed far beyond the scale of recent demonstrations and approximated the dignity of a civil insurrection, recalling the days of the commune in Paris, has been recorded in Russia since the street fighting at Warsaw during the Polish revolutions of 1830 and 1863.

The events of Jan. 22 in St. Petersburg, "Red Sunday," were merely the dispersal of unarmed crowds by soldiers, but at Lodz the troops were desperately opposed by an army of 60,000 working men, many armed with revolvers, defending substantial barricades with bullets and showers of paving stones and other missiles, and with bullets and showers of paving stones and other missiles.

The industrial quarters were apparently largely in the hands of the manifestants, and the task of the troops was akin to that of the Russian soldiers in the war in Turkestan, when towns had to be stormed street by street, almost house by house.



Nelidoff, the Russian negotiators, to reach Washington and as there will be little preliminary work for them to do until the Japanese terms are submitted.
