PRIMARY ORANGE LODGES

Meeting of Imperial Grand Council as Toronto Shows Good Progress,

Toronto, July 17.—Reports of the contoday's session of the Imperial Grand Council of the Loyal Orange Association of the World.

The number of primary Orange lodges under the jurisdiction of the imperial grand council is 4,007, and the increase since the meeting of the the increase since the meeting of the council in Dublin three years ago has been 302 lodges.

The report of Secretary Rice gives the following statistics of growth: Ireland, gain 19, total 1,650 lodges; England, 300 lodges; Scotland, gain 26: total. 290.
