Not only had Major Davis been made a lieutenant-colonel by that time, but, in recognition of his gallant services, he was invested with the order of Companion of St. Michael and St. George. **BOARD IS SUSPICIOUS** Wines, Medicines and Even Liniment Are Being Scrutinized.

Notwithstanding rumors to the effect that the Ontario license board had under consideration the banning of certain medicines claimed to be used as bev erages, County Inspector J. B. Keenleyside and City Inspector Birrell claim to know of no medicines sold in the city which are being used as liquor substitutes. Since Jamaica ginger was placed un-

Since Jamaica ginger was placed under control there have been few booze substitutes experimented with by the thirsty ones of this city, according to the license inspectors.

The license inspectors claim that any medicine which contains alcohol in suf-ficient quantity to intoxicate could not be consumed in any but the smallest doses without making the person sick. The medication, they believe, will pre-vent its being used at any time as a

However, under the revised statutes, the license board may submit samples of a medicine to the provincial board of health. If this body considers the medication is not sufficient to prevent people drinking it for the alcohol contained it, it may issue a certificate forbidding its sale. The certificate of the health authorities is binding in the courts.

A further provision in the amended statutes is one which decrees that the board may make it an offence to sell a potent are likely and the courts. patent medicine, which, owing to al-cohol in the medicine, would be liable to be taken in quantities injurious to the health. Within the next few weeks practically all the well-known patent medicines in which alcohol forms a large part will be submitted to the provincial board of health for a report.


