RAILWAY BOARD INCREASES FOR SHOPMEN GIVEN

Range From Forty-Three Per Cent Down, Like McAdoo Award.

Winnipeg, Man., July 19.—The announcement made by the Canadian railway board respecting application of the McAdoo award was given out yesterday. This award provides for a 43 per cent increase for shopmen, but down to 43 per cent for other employees. These increases will be effective on August 1 for all employees except those belonging to organizations whose agreements with the various companies have expired, and for those that may be effected back further than May 1, 1918. ADVOCATES DEGREE OF COMMERCE FOR LONDON UNIVERSITY

Arthur J. Balfour Maintains Benefits Would Be Far-Reaching.

London, July 19.—With the endorsement of Arthur J. Balfour, the foreign secretary, a campaign is under way to have London University institute the study of degrees in commerce. Balfour was the chief speaker, the scheme was warmly endorsed and a committee was appointed to raise funds to further the campaign. After dealing with various objections, especially the contention that the scheme would lower the standard of the university, Mr. Balfour said the courses of study proposed would have a narrowing effect, and the cost of living has been increased to such an extent that the university is in a difficult position. He is totally inadequate.

NORTHERN SECTION OF MURMAN ROAD TAKEN BY ALLIES

British, French, American and Serbian Forces Landed

Amsterdam, July 19.—Rear-Admiral Kemp of the British navy has proclaimed the occupation of the northern section of the Murman railway by British, American, French and Serbian forces, says Max Behrmann, the Stockholm correspondent of the Berlin Volkszeitung, under date of July 18. The admiral, he adds, also announced that the forces would advance southward "in accordance with the local soviet authorities and the request of the local population for help."

Behrmann says that there are no Soviet authorities in the Murman district. On the entire 400-mile stretch of railway only at half a dozen main points are there a few rudimentary political organizations. The largest of these is at Alexandrovsk, comprising 400 members. These communities, Behrmann declares, were until now unorganized, but since they have split into numerous parties whose services go to the highest bidder.

Behrmann further alleges regarding a request for help from the population, that the forces would advance southward "in accordance with the local soviet authorities and the request of the local population for help."

The newspaper prints an Archangel message to the Soviet of Moscow, which mentions the arrival there of Italian and Serbian officers and men, who, it declares, were welcomed and escorted by the local soviet.

A zoologist named Schmidt who has just returned to Petrograd, according to the Nord Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, declares that the British and the garrison is well supplied with food from England.

FOOD CONDITIONS IN OLD LAND IMPROVE

Wheat Reserves Absolutely Safe, Reports Food Boss.

London, July 19.—Wheat reserves in Great Britain now are absolutely safe, says the food minister, in a speech last night in the House of Commons. The situation, he said, is such that the government can release a greater quantity from reserve and to improve the quality of flour soon.

Mr. Clynes also announced an impending improvement in the food situation. He said that instead of the present 70 per cent imported and 30 per cent domestic, the proportion would be 70 per cent that the amount of meat imported would be nearer 20 than 30 per cent.
