THE PORTUGUESE ASSASSINATIONS.

With appalling dramatic suddenness, Portugal has been plunged either into the throes of a revolution or the uncertainty attending the accession of a young and inexperienced prince to a disputed throne. For the terrible act which has all but extinguished the reigning family, no words of condemnation are too strong, and it is another of the senseless crimes that have rather retarded than assisted the cause of democracy. It is yet uncertain to what particular group of extremists the responsibility of this tragedy is to be assigned—the report that two of the assassins are not natives of the country, if it is confirmed, points in the meantime to anarchical origin. But whether attributable to general hatred of the monarchical order, or to the particular and complicated political disorder of Portugal, the consequences to that country are equally serious and disastrous.

As in most European continental countries enjoying representative government, Portugal has produced a series of political parties divided into Conservatives, also called Regenerators, Progressives or Liberals, Independents and Republicans. Since 1893 there has also been a renewal of activity on behalf of Dom Miguel, Duke of Braganza, now an officer in the Austrian army, whose supporters are known as Miguelists. The late king's reign of eighteen years has been marked by continuous friction among these parties, and it is difficult to say whether the Absolutists or the Republicans have been the source of greatest danger. Down to a comparatively recent period a Conservative government held office by considerable majorities, but for some time past Portuguese ministries have been unable to command parliamentary majorities, and the strained condition of the country's finances caused, it is claimed, by the diversion of public funds to private objects, resulted.

The present premier, Dom Joao Franco Castello Branco, is the leader of a new political party known as the party of Liberal regeneration. Since his entry upon office he has made strenuous efforts to restore the national finances, abolishing at one stroke parliamentary sinecures worth \$200,000. He also cut down the allowance of the queen dowager by \$40,000, and put a stop to the withdrawal of public funds without proper sanction, while increasing the salaries of the poorly-paid government employees and army and navy officers. These changes resulted in a considerable saving to the treasury, but a crisis came with the budget of 1906, which failed to pass the cortes, and the premier then took advantage of the provision of the constitution, which permits the government to maintain the same budget for the year succeeding. This tided the government over the fiscal year to June 30 last, and the king then appealed to an unwritten Portuguese law, permitting him in such a case to conduct the government for a period of three years without parliamentary support. Senhor Franco thus assumed what he himself described as an administrative dictatorship, and declined to summon a new parliament, intimating that he would confine himself to the promulgation, in the form of executive decrees, of such laws as were absolutely indispensable to public administration.

In a recent interview with William Maxwell, the famous war correspondent of The London, England, Daily Mail, Senhor Franco vigorously defended his purely administrative. Our first duty is to establish our finances on a sound basis." A more questionable step of the premier was the issuance of a decree suppressing the press of Lisbon and Oporto and creating practically a star chamber process of trial and punishment for all persons accused of conspiring against the existing order or connected with attempts to disturb the security of the state.

Internationally the situation may develop grave possibilities, in which Great Britain is specially interested under the numerous treaties with Portugal, entered into since the beginning of the eighteenth century. Their net effect amounts to virtual guaranty by Britain of Portuguese independence and integrity, and rumors of British intervention have been set afoot on various occasions since the political troubles became acute. The situation that now arises will test Senhor Franco's capacity to the utmost, and if it be the case, as is claimed, that the army is disaffected towards the crown, a point may arise calling for international action. Reports of a possible abdication of the king and the establishment of a regency have not been unknown, but so long as the people remained quiet, hope of an ultimate solution in a less revolutionary manner was not abandoned. Now the crisis has come unexpectedly and completely, and it is too soon as yet to gather what

THE THAW TRIAL.

Respect for the course of criminal procedure in the Empire State of the republic would have stood at a higher level today, had the second trial of Harry Thaw, for the murder of Stanford White, been the first and last. As it is the history of this terrible crime, its consequences to the families of the principals and its effect upon the reputation of both bench and bar of New York State, and the general demoralization of the public it has entailed is probably unparalleled in criminal annals. Certainly the license granted or assumed by a certain section of the American press has never been pushed to such an extreme. The unfortunate weakling who has succeeded in establishing so unenviable a prominence has been tried and re-tried, by all kinds of amateur and irresponsible judges, intent not on securing a fair, impartial and dignified trial, but on pandering to tastes little less abnormal and depraved than those that immediately led to so terrible a catastrophe.

Perhaps the verdict that the jury delivered approximately meets the demands of abstract justice, since there can be little doubt that the accused, if not always mentally unbalanced, was not of normal type. Whether his condition was of a character that released him from legal responsibility for the crime, is a point for expert decision, and, as usual, it did not agree. As Judge Dowling put it, an accused is entitled to the benefit of the doubt, and a jury may well refuse to accept the responsibility of weighing the contradictory opinions of skilled professional witnesses. Then the complete change in the case presented for the state must have had considerable effect, especially when coupled with the new and authentic documentary and other evidence supporting the argument that Thaw acted under the influence of a strong and ungovernable obsession. A popular demonstration seems to have greeted him on his departure from the prison, but this, after the recent very similar outburst in London, must be said to the account of human weakness rather than national perversity.

LICENSEHOLDERS MAY APPEAL TO GOVERNMENT

If People Had to Pay for Compensation, Agitation Would Simmer Down.

The License Holders' Association will hold a meeting on Tuesday to consider a plan of campaign, in general, for future battles against the ideas of local option and the cutting out of licenses. The distillers and brewers have not decided what action they will take as yet, but a committee has been named to outline a plan of action in regard to the recent reduction in this city. Rumors that the license commission in Toronto will resign have been absolutely contradicted from several authoritative quarters. In the meantime, the temperance people are all business, and already several petitions are in circulation in different parts of the city, which will be presented to the license commission, asking that certain hotels in the remote corners of the city be cut off. One was being circulated Friday, which was signed by 190 names, asking that a certain east end hotel be sacrificed.

To the World yesterday a prominent member of the License Holders' Association said the only remedy for all this fighting, trouble and spending of big money, if the existence of licenses was to be maintained at all, was to get the provincial government to provide a law of compensation. "If we are not doing a legitimate business, let us get out. We are co-workers with the government, and in fact, part of the government, and it is up to the government to protect us. And that is the idea that the License Holders' Association will probably bring before the government, and in fact, may ask the legislature to take the question entirely out of the hands of the council. This might relieve the situation at present in Toronto, for there is not a shadow of a doubt that the members of the council feel that they have made a mistake in the matter and have not got the real endorsement of the citizens. The council might be persuaded to ask the government to take the proposition out of their hands."

MORAL CRUSADES CAN'T IGNORE PUBLIC OPINION

And Council's Spurt Trick Will Yet Prove Unwise, Argues "Saturday Night."
