The Gulf of Finland is an arm of the Baltic Sea, between Finland and the Russian Baltic Provinces. At the eastern end of the Bay is Kronstadt, the outer port of Petrograd. The entrance to the gulf is guarded by the fortresses of Helsingfors. Hango and Revel.

The fact that only light Garman warships were employed on Friday, however, indicates that the purpose of the German admiralty was merely to make a quick raid.

## MAN MURDERS WIFE THEN KILLS HIMSELF

William Stokes, Former Asylum

William Stokes, Former Asylum Inmate, Commits Ghastly Crime at Brockville.

Brockville.

Brockville, Nov. 13.—Shortly after eight o'clock this morning, Wm. Stokes, aged 40, a discharged patient of the Eastern Hospital for the Insane, murdered his wife, who was formerly Mrs. Floyd McLean, after one week of married life. He afterwards cut his own throat and died in the hospital in three hours without making a statethree hours without making a statement. The tragedy took place at the home of W. J. Gilder, a commercial traveler, where Mrs. Stokes had been working as a domestic both prior to three hours without making a stateand since her marriage. The couple were married in Prescott on the 6th inst., after being refused a license in

The first intimation of the murder came to Mrs. Gilder, who on proceeding upstairs to arouse her two younger children, observed Stokes standing in the door of his bedroom, attired only in his night clothing which was covered with blood, and with his throat cut from ear to ear. Rushing into her own room, Mrs. Gilder closed the door. Stokes attempted to follow her, but she succeded in keeping him out. Mrs. Gilder thought of her children in a room adjoining that of her-murderer, and dashing past him she made her escape by a rear stairway with the two tots and out into the street, where she raised an alarm. Stokes was found lying on the bed beside the body of his wife, whose life was extinct. She was horribly mutilated and had evidently fought desperately to ward off the attack of the maniac.
