MAN STILL UNDER GUISE OF PERFUME FACTORY

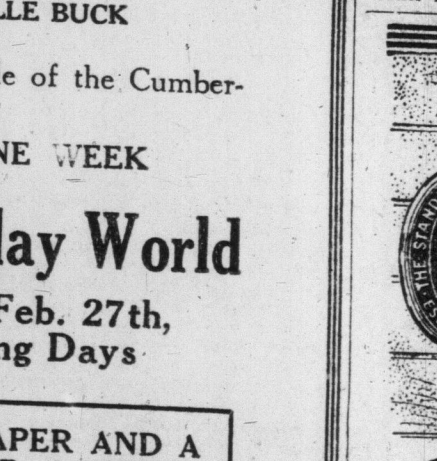

Berlin, Feb. 24.—Questioned today at the economic council as to whether he would give the German people's unanimous "no" to the London conference, Dr. Simons, the foreign minister, said:

"We undoubtedly shall have to face an extraordinarily violent storm in London, for the Paris decisions with regard to reparations do not constitute demands which have been met at random." They have come into being as a result of fierce conflicts, and I believe, in great haste, in order to meet the absolute necessities of the financial situation of our opponents.

"In drafting our counter-proposals we must reckon on the unity of our opponents."
