Drowning Accident at the Soo.

Herbert Delamere Hill, who was irowned at the Soo, was born in Strathroy, and was in his 24th year. He was the only child of Venerable Archdeacon Hill of St. Thomas, and received his early education in the latter town. In 1899 he matriculated from the St. Thomas Collegiate Institute, and enter-Thomas Collegiate Institute, and entered the university with the class of '03. After his graduation in classics he entered the Imperial Bank. Late last fall he was transferred to Sault Ste. Marie. During his course at the university. "Canon," as he was most frequently called, endeared himself to all who knew him. Genial, big-hearted and generous to a fault, he had a wide circle of sincere friends among the students, the faculty and outside of the college. His is the first death to break the ranks of the year of '03.

The fatality is rendered the more pathetic by the fact that yesterday morning, when his death had become known among his friends in Toronto, one of them received a letter, stating that he was coming to Toronto next

They had planned for a sailboat ride, and, in spite of the fact that a gale of 60 miles an bour was coming off Lake Superior, and white aps were running at least six feet high, they were undaunted.

Warned Not to Go.

After banking hours, young Hill called at the Bank of Commerce for his companion, and Manager Robarts of the bank warned them that it was dangerous to go. They replied that the breeze would only serve to make it interesting. Both were members of the Soo Boat Club. Neither was regarded as an experienced sailor, and the caretaker of the boat clubhouse also warned them, but they only laughed and declared they were not afraid.

They went down the river a short distance below the lighthouse, had turned about and were heading up stream when the accident occurred. At this point, the current is very strong, and when the wind caught the sail with a jerk the boat was suddenly capsized, and both young men sank without making a cry that could be heard on shore where they were being watched by several persons.

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
