REVOLUTION IN CHINA.
TO OVERTHROW DYNASTYOutbreaks of a Serious Character Reported From Many
Parts of the Empire—An Imperial Edict Issued Like That
at the Time of the Boxer Outbreak.

(Victoria Colonist.)

Advices received by the R. M. S. Empress of China tell of a serious and-
passive revolution threatening the Man-
churia court in China. The Kokumun
of Tokyo regards the empress as seriously
threatening to overthrow the present
rulers of China. The Tokyo paper says: "In
a great majority of cases the fall of a
dynasty in China has been preceded by
the outbreak of similar discontent among
the people, and by evidences of similar
inability on the part of the authorities to
preserve order. The two great centres of
disaffection in China are Hunan and
Kwangtung. Nothing is wanting but a
junction of these two to create a formidable
rebellion." From other sources news
is given of outbreaks in Manchuria, Shan-
tung and in the Yangtze valley. In Man-
churia a Chinese battalion of 500 men at
Hailuogang on the Kirin highroad mutinied
and assassinated the regimental
officers, throwing in their lot with the
rebels who are massing in North Man-
churia. In Shantung province also there
is a strong rebel movement. There the
outbreak is a recurrence of Boxerism,
and by other secret societies. Large forces
of foreign-trained troops are being sent
against these rebels to endeavor to bring
them in on four sides. In the movement
the younger brother of Viceroy Yuan Shih
Kai, in command of his brother's troops,
was killed in battle with the rebels.

Imperial troops sent against these insur-
gents are armed with field artillery, moun-
tain guns and cavalry.

Against the rebels in the Yangtze val-
ley about 20,000 soldiers detailed by the
government have been so far effective only
in compelling the revolutionists to remove
their headquarters to the Hunan from
Kiangsi, but unable to completely sup-
press them. The insurgents skillfully
change their rendezvous, and, using their
force, thereby embarrassing the dis-
turbance in no small degree. According
to advices coming through an English
channel, it is doubtful whether the dis-
turbance can be crushed should the troops
at the disposal of the government be de-
spatched into Hunan province.

Placards posted by the insurgents show
that they aim at overthrowing the Manchu
dynasty. The placards charge the Man-
chu government with stealing the throne
at the cost of innumerable Chinese
lives, and with conducting the affairs of
state so inefficiently that the empire is
being regarded as an equal by foreign
powers is despised by them. The five mil-
lions of Manchuria who sit in the seats of
authority are said to be "a few thousands
of the nation's brow, while themselves,
toiling not and spinning not, and their
sovereign, counting himself the delegate
of Heaven, looks down upon all true Chi-
nese as mere slaves and robbers. He car-
ries this doctrine into the whole adminis-
tration and is indifferent to any fate that
Chinese and their belongings. The whole
government is conducted on a system of
bribery and the people are kept perpetually
on the rack of extortion. The cir-
cumstances by declaring that while the
people are condemned to such sufferings
the Manchus court revel in luxury and
waste millions of taels on voluptuous en-
joyments. In fact, the document is ab-
solutely anti-dynastic. In consequence of
the rebellion the Chinese at Shanghai are
adopting vigorous measures to check the
import of arms and ammunition. It ap-
pears that the revolutionary societies are
secretly purchasing warlike material and

THE WARD SYSTEM

Bill Advocating it Will be Sent
to Fredericton in a Few Days

The bill to change the system of elect-
ing aldermen at civic elections in St. John
has now been prepared by the common
clerk and will soon be forwarded to the
council and will soon be forwarded to the
legislative assembly for enactment. With
the exception that the number of alder-
men at large is increased from two to four
it is practically a return to the ward sys-
tem. The action under the present act
requiring every candidate to reside or do
business in the ward for which he is nomi-
nated is repealed and in future it will
be necessary only for the nomination to
be made by two electors qualified to vote
in the ward. The candidate may reside
in any portion of the city.

Section 2.—"Every candidate
for the office of mayor or alderman-at-
large shall be nominated by two electors
qualified to vote in any ward of the city,
and for four of the persons nominated for
the office of alderman-at-large, but for the
office of alderman of a ward only the elec-
tors in that ward entitled to vote there-
to vote for the office of mayor shall be
the common council of the city of St.
John."

Section 3.—"In the election and elections
hereafter to be held for the office of
mayor or alderman in the city of St. John
every elector of the said city entitled to
vote therein at a civic election for mayor
shall be entitled to vote for one of the
persons nominated for the office of mayor,

vote therein at a civic election for mayor
shall be entitled to vote for one of the
persons nominated for the office of mayor,
and for four of the persons nominated for
the office of alderman-at-large, but for the
office of alderman of a ward only the elec-
tors in that ward entitled to vote there-
to vote for the office of mayor shall be
the common council of the city of St.
John."

Section 12.—"From and after the time
when the mayor and aldermen are elected
and sworn under this act, the mayor or
the chairman of the board in the chair
with nine or more of the aldermen shall
be the common council of the city of St.
John."

Section 13.—"In the election and elections
hereafter to be held for the office of
mayor or alderman in the city of St. John
every elector of the said city entitled to
vote therein at a civic election for mayor
shall be entitled to vote for one of the
persons nominated for the office
