

KILLED BY FREIGHT TRAIN NEAR NORTON

Joseph Henderson Met an Awful Death This Morning. He Was Seen at the Station Last Night and This Morning His Body Was Found Beside Track With His Skull Crushed

SUSSEX, N. B., Nov. 9.—(Special)—A man, supposed to be Joseph Henderson, of Henderson Settlement, Kings County, was killed this a. m. by the west-bound freight No. 11, about 2:30 o'clock. The deceased came from St. John on the mid-night express and got off at Norton station. He was seen by a lady who had just got off at Norton and who identified him this morning as being the same person.

ELEVATOR BURNED

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 9.—Fire last night destroyed the Great Northern elevator "A," in Superior, together with 600,000 bushels of grain, principally wheat, all of which was fully covered by insurance. The elevator was owned by the Great Northern Railroad, but was leased to the A. D. Thompson Grain Co., of Duluth. While the Great Lakes Dredge and Dock Company dock and the Duluth Superior Storage Company, which contained the finishing plant of the Wheeler Chair Company, were partly demolished, entailing an aggregate loss of more than \$1,000,000. Several elevators in the vicinity were on fire for a time, but firemen extinguished the flames.

FREDERICTON WANTS BETTER TRAIN SERVICE TO MILLVILLE

KING EDWARD'S BIRTHDAY BEING CELEBRATED TODAY THROUGHOUT THE EMPIRE

His Majesty Celebrated the Event at Sandringham With Dinner to the Tenantry--Notable Gathering of Royalty ---The Lord Mayor's Show in London.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The anniversary of the birthday of King Edward, who was born on November 9, 1841, was observed today throughout the British empire with the customary military and naval salutes and displays. His Majesty is celebrating the event at Sandringham where the king and queen of Spain and the queen of Norway are staying in addition to many other members of the British royal family. The morning was occupied in receiving an immense number of congratulatory telegrams, letters and presents from almost all parts of the world, one of the most notable events being the presentation to the king of the Cullinan diamond, the largest known, estimated to be worth \$750,000 and presented to his majesty by the legislative assembly of the Transvaal as a token of the loyalty of the people of that colony and in commemoration of the grant of responsible government. The presentation was made by Sir Richard Solomon, ex-Lieutenant Governor of the Transvaal, representing the Transvaal, and representatives of the colony were present. During the afternoon their majesties entertained the tenantry of Sandringham at dinner.

CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

He was released on personal bail of \$1,000 and two sureties of \$500 each.
