There were four marriages and thirteen births reported to Registrar J. B. Jones during the present week. Of the births were females and 5 males.

Of the fifteen men in the G. P. squad, only three are natives of St. John. Alderman Lewis said this morning that the men are doing great work.

The new ferry boat Ludlow was out around the harbor from yesterday. The crew with the engineers are getting acquainted with the working of the machinery and steering apparatus.

The traffic for teams will be stopped on Monday for teams crossing the harbor on the ferry. The boats will be taken out of the city, and what designing is to be done will be commenced.

An enquiry at Mr. W. H. Murray's residence this morning elicited the information that Mr. Murray had passed a very comfortable night, and a slight improvement was noticeable in his condition.

Nine deaths were reported to the Board of Health during the past week, resulting from the following causes: Diphtheria 2, and one each from meningitis, malarium, consumption, still-born, pelvic tumor, cerebral paralysis, accidentally killed.

Inspector Howard, of the Board of Health received word from Fredrickton on Thursday last that his sister, Mrs. Orange, had been stricken with paralysis. Mr. Howard left for the capital yesterday.

It is stated that \$100,000 was left in the town of Digby by tourists this season. Twelve other towns in the province did equally well. The income from this source would exceed \$2,000,000 per annum. There are many places well situated to do it.

THE DEVIL IS HERE

Lewis Morrison Opened His Engagement at the Opera House in Faust Last Night.

Lewis Morrison is with us again. Clad in flaming raiment, and accompanied by thunder, lightning and the smell of brimstone, he appeared at the Opera House last night in his time honored role of the devil. And he is the same smiling, smiling, cynical devil that we have seen before. He lacks the sulphurous effect and appears, as he has always done, as a most amusing Mephisto, rather than a creature to be shunned and feared.

Morrison's devil is the principal, but not the only, feature of the very excellent production of Faust, with which that veteran actor continues to entertain and attract thousands of theatre-goers all over the country.

There is little new in this year's production of Faust, there can be little new in it, for Morrison's empyrean has become one of the classics of the stage and can hardly change. True, there may be a few more lost souls in the elaborate by-wind picture of the infernal regions which Mephisto and Faust view from the summit of the Brocken; there may be, and is, more smoke, more whirling fire and more sulphurous, choking stench, but that is all. When the whole production is analyzed there is but one factor that stands out pre-eminent over the others, and that is Morrison's flaming red-headed devil.

Mr. Morrison is, as usual, supported by an excellent company. Frank Angus, who played the part of Faust, is a manly, impulsive character, appealing to excellent advantage in the more strongly emotional parts. Mr. Trimble as Valentine, although in a minor part, showed much ability in the death scene, after he has been wounded by Faust, and the climax in this act was perhaps the finest piece of work done during the evening, outside of Mr. Morrison's part.

Miss Inez Forman played Marguerite. Her manner is pleasing, her acting quite up to the standard of the company.

Several musical numbers introduced by Misses Winslow and Scarth, and Messrs. Smith, LaRoux, Goodman and Trimble, were very enjoyable.

The engagement will conclude with matinee and evening performances today.

WATER AND SEWERAGE

Many Minor Matters Considered by the Board Yesterday.

The water and sewerage board met yesterday afternoon and disposed of a lot of petitions and communications for work about the city.

It was decided to change a cut-off on the new pipe at the reservoir from 24 inches to 36 inches.

A communication from James Pender & Co., asking for a catch basin was referred to the superintendent with power to make a temporary arrangement.

A communication was received from the board of health to the effect that Mrs. Nona Ferguson, of Window street, Carleton, had no drainage from her house and that there had been a case of typhoid fever.

The communication was filed. It was decided that the director and recorder take action on all who have not complied with the law regarding putting in sewerage.

It was decided to fix the charge for supplying water to the new dredge owned by G. S. Mayes at \$5 a month. A large number of minor matters relating to sewerage and laying pipes in various parts of the city were dealt with.

Rev. Edward C. Hennigar, of this city, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Hennigar, of Orange street, will be married on Tuesday next at Sackville to Miss May Hart of the latter place. The ceremony will take place on Tuesday morning and the young couple will be married at Sackville. After the ceremony and leave by the C. P. R. on the evening train for the west.

Between 200 and 300 delegates are expected to be present at the first meetings of the United Baptist Association of New Brunswick, and will represent all parts of the province.

NEXT SATURDAY

J. N. Harvey Will Open His New Union Street Store—Event in Clothing Trade.

The most important recent development in the clothing trade of St. John is the transaction by which J. N. Harvey, the Union street clothier, becomes proprietor of both the clothing stores in the Opera House block. There is one on each side of the entrance to the Opera House, and now Mr. Harvey has them both, and is connecting them with a wide passage in the rear, so that customers can pass from one into the other.

The one on the east side has been conducted by the Montreal Clothing Co., but Mr. Harvey recently bought them out, and is now completing the work of connecting this store with his present House entrance, as already described.

Each store has a handsome front, with big windows for display, on Union street. As a result of the purchase, Mr. Harvey will be able to give up the whole of his present premises to men's and boys' clothing, and devote the other store to men's furnishings, hats and caps, trunks, bags, and similar goods. This will be a great gain, as he has been for two months cramped for space, although his store was enlarged by knocking out a wall and taking in another one two years ago.

Under the new arrangement, with one department devoted to clothing and the other to furnishings, etc., and the two of them connected, he will be in a position to make a splendid display of goods, and his staff will be able to serve customers with much greater ease and promptness. He will also, of course, be able to carry a larger and more varied stock.

Four years ago Mr. Harvey began business in St. John, in a comparatively small store. With this second enlargement, his store has become one of the great establishments to clothing buyers. Speaking of drainage, the secretary of the board said that the large majority of houses are furnished with taps and sinks, there was not always running water in the drains from closets.
