The two C. P. A. officials have been at the recent meeting of the maritime division of the press association held at Truro (N. S.), where the claims of the association were presented. The dominion-wide body is doing much to coordinate the protection to unify business methods and to seek the fullest cooperation in all essentials. The division will seek to increase membership, and advance if possible, subscription and advertising rates, a necessity in view of the high costs of production. The dominion in a year over 200 weeklies have advanced to \$1.50 a year.
