BOARD TO ADVISE ON GETTING BEST FROM RESOURCES

Ottawa, Nov. 30—After a year's con-
sideration of the best method of govern-
mental procedure to encourage and as-
sist in Canada manufacturing develop-
ment based on scientific and technical
research, the minister of trade and com-
merce, Sir George Foster, has secured
the appointment by the government of
an honorary advisory council on indus-
trial and scientific research. The coun-
cil consists of university professors in
the departments of applied science and
of men prominent in steel and engineer-
ing work. The appointment of the coun-
cil is in line with action taken months
ago by the United States and Great
Britain where governmental action was
taken early in the war to secure the best
expert advice with a view to taking full
advantage of the trade and manufactur-
ing opportunities offered by the exclu-
sion of Germany from the world's mar-
kets.

The object in view is to increase tech-
nical and scientific research and utilize
the results for the development of pro-
duction and trade. It is hoped that the
free assistance thus offered to industrial
firms will enable Canada to keep abreast
of the world's manufacturing develop-
ment during the war and of the keen in-
ternational competition which will fol-
low it.

The advisory council appointed is as
follows: A. Stanley MacKenzie, Ph.D.,
president of Dalhousie College, Halifax;
P. D. Adams, Ph.D., dean of the faculty
of Applied Science, McGill University,
Montreal; R. F. Rittan, M.D., professor
of organic and biological chemistry, Mc-
Gill University; J. C. McLennan, Ph.D.,

University of Toronto: A. B. MacAllum,

In the order in council providing for
the appointment of the advisory coun-
cil, it is stated that a similar scheme was
adopted in Great Britain last year with
the object of establishing a permanent or-
ganization for the promotion of scien-
tific and industrial research. Representa-
tions were made that the British ad-
visory council should be extended so as
to embrace inter-imperial effort and co-
operation, but so far no definite action
along this line has been taken. The min-
ister of trade and commerce points out
the urgent necessity of organizing, no-
tifying and encouraging the existing re-
sources of industrial and scientific re-
search in Canada with the purpose of
utilizing waste products, discovering new
processes—mechanical, chemical and
metallurgical and developing into useful
industries. He also points out the ad-
vantages to industry and commerce the
unused natural resources of Canada.

Cabinet Committee.

Sir George Foster also notes that, in
addition to the university science de-
partments there are many private, corporate
and government laboratories more or less
engaged in research while the manu-
facturers' associations are also anxious
to co-operate. After consulting the sci-
entific men and the manufacturers, the
minister says that co-ordination of effort
can best be brought about by the ap-
pointment of a committee of the cabinet
consisting of the minister of trade and
commerce, the minister of inland revenue,
the minister of labor and the minister
of agriculture, who shall be charged with
responsibility for all expenditures voted
by parliament for scientific and indus-
trial research under the advice of the
honorary advisory committee.

The duties of this advisory committee
are defined in a general way and in-
clude the securing of mutual co-operation
in solving problems of research, the
co-ordinating of results, etc. The travel-
ling expenses of the committee are to be
paid by the minister of trade and com-
merce and a permanent secretary is to
be appointed.

DEPARTMENT OF LANDS AND MINES

The annual report of the provincial de-
partment of lands and mines is summa-
rized in a despatch to the Standard as
follows:

Despite reverse conditions brought
about by the war in Europe, the de-
partment of lands and mines has been
successful in its collection for the year
ending October 31st, 1916, of nearly \$8,000
in royalties from the sale of timber
licenses and the sale of land.

The amount of the territorial revenue
for the last year is an exceptional one,
having exceeded all expectations, being
well above the average. Last year New
Brunswick had its greatest territorial re-
venue in the history of the province.

The revenue of the past year is all the
more remarkable when it is considered
that the stumpage collection for the year
ending October 31st, 1916, is \$70,000 less
than during the previous year. This is
accounted for by the fact that lumber-
men on the North Shore have not cut
last winter than ordinarily.

While there was a decrease in the
stumpage collection, it is noteworthy
that an increase in the game license
between \$4,000 and \$5,000 is reported.
The department also announces today
that a 20 per cent increase in royalties
during the previous year. The renewal
of timber licenses also resulted in an in-
crease of \$2,500, while new ground was
applied for and an increase in this
category of \$4,500. There was also a gain
in mining licenses issued of nearly \$8,000
and also an increase of 135 per cent in
the amount of fines collected for viola-
tion of the game and fire laws, showing
that the department has a stricter en-
forcement of these laws.

Record Receipts.

Manager William Bedell of the Yale
Athletic Association's ticket department,
has announced today that \$158,800 was
realized from the sale of tickets to the
Yale-Harvard game on last Saturday.
This is \$62,000 more than the largest
previous record at a Yale football game,
the amount taken in when the bowl was
opened two years ago.

Of the sum received this year, \$14,000
was expended in the erection of the tem-
porary stands. The expense for ushers
was about \$2,000. From the sale of pro-
grams about \$2,500 was received and
from the automobile parking space just
outside the bowl about \$2,700. The Red
Cross collection taken in the bowl Sat-
urday totaled \$8,487. This, of course, does
not go to the Yale Athletic Association,
but, including this item, the sum of
money received at the bowl on Saturday
amounts to \$168,729.
