A request was received from the local Red Cross that members assist in giving drives to the soldier patients in the East Saint John County Hospital.

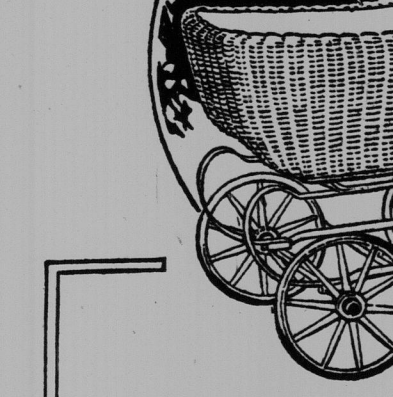
The members were asked to lend their assistance to the Red Cross in this regard.

Tanker And Ferry Launched At Palmer's Shipyard, Jarrow

First of Anglo-Saxon Fleet and Australian Steamer Built in Britain—Is Steel Single Screw Motorship, 9,900 Deadweight Tons

The first of a fleet of oil tankers ordered from various shipbuilders by the Anglo-Saxon Petroleum Co. Ltd., of London, has been launched at Palmer's Shipyard, Jarrow. She is the Pecten, a steel, single screw motorship of about 9,900 deadweight tons. She will have a length overall of 40 feet and has been built under Lloyd's special survey to their highest class for the carrying of petroleum in bulk, the construction being on the combined longitudinal and transverse system of framing. Propulsion will be by a four-cylinder, six-cylinder, double acting Wapora engine constructed by the North-Eastern Marine Engineering Co., Ltd., of Wallsend.

OPTIMISM OF FUTURE

Speaking after the launching, Summers Hunter, chairman and managing director of the North-Eastern Marine Engineering Co., Ltd., congratulated the Palmer's company on having built such a vessel which had numerous outstanding features. It was, he said, probably the largest vessel to be fitted with single screw diesel engines. Although his firm had built the engines they could not claim all the credit for them, for they were assisted by the designers of the type, and also with Mr. Zulver, of the Anglo-Saxon Co. They had developed the engine, and experiments were being carried out which he was confident would be successful. It would be fitting as Palmer's had built the engines, but that was simply one of the things which had due to the saving of the pendulum. It was very pleasing to see Palmer's yards so comparatively full of work, and he hoped the future of the firm would surpass its past record. There was no finality in shipbuilding and he limited to the requirements of the British Empire in regard to ships. Palmer's had done their full share in the past in regard to the building of merchant and warships. Times were bad just now but there was always a gleam of sunshine.

SYDNEY FERRY

Following the launching of the Kalang, a few weeks before, the double-ended vehicular and passenger steamer Karakara, the second of two vessels built for Sydney Ferry, Ltd., for service in Sydney Harbor, N. S. W., has been launched from the Salford shipyard of J. C. Robinson & Co., Ltd.

The Kalang and Karakara represent a type developed to suit the

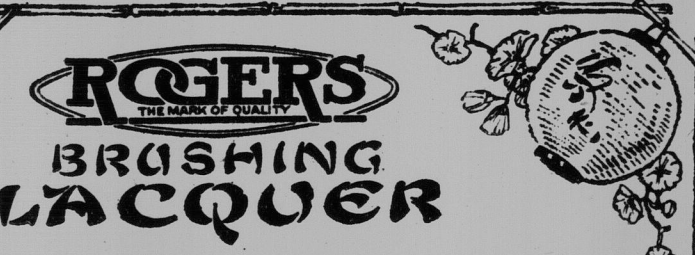
special service conditions in Sydney Harbor and yet be thoroughly seaworthy vessels, capable of making the 14,000 miles' voyage to Australia under her own power. The performance of a sister vessel, built for this firm, both at sea and on service, has given complete satisfaction to her owners in both these divergent respects.

PRINCIPAL DIMENSIONS

The principal dimensions of Karakara and Kalang are as follows: Length overall, 199 feet; length between perpendiculars, 187 feet; breadth extreme, 48 feet 3 1/2 inches; breadth moulded, 33 feet; 6 inches; depth moulded, 11 feet. The vessels are designed to carry 80 vehicles or an equivalent of deck passengers on a draft of 12 feet 2 inch and a displacement of 1,120 tons.

The propelling machinery by Pien & Son, Ltd., Newbury, consists of a set of triple expansion direct-acting surface-condensing engines, having cylinders 15 1/2 inches, 26 inches, by 48 inches, by 24 inch stroke, capable of developing 1,100 h. p. and driving propellers at both ends and giving this vessels a speed of 13 knots. Two boilers are installed of the through multi-tubular cylindrical type by Riley Bros. (Boilermakers), Ltd., Stockton-on-Tees, each having a diameter of 8 feet 7 inches and an o. a. length of 19 feet 9 inches, the combined heating surface being 2,960 square feet and the working pressure 180 pounds per square inch, the same makers supplying engines and boilers for both vessels.

Fitting out on the Kalang is now nearing completion, and it is anticipated that trials will be run and preparations for voyage completed about mid-April, the Karakara following shortly thereafter.

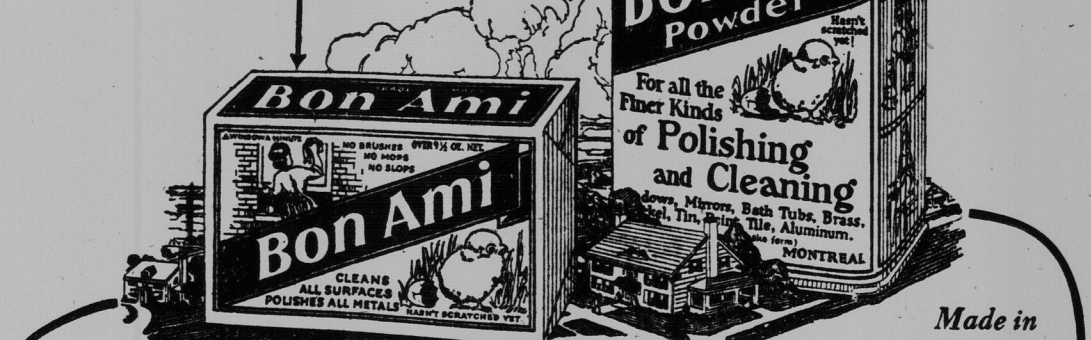
